Married in Clerk's Office—A marriage ceremony was performed in the county clerk's office yesterday by Deputy Clerk David A. Smith and the contracting parties were Ellis Carlson and Miss Laura Parmore, both of Salt Lake.

Alumni Meeting Tonight—The annual meeting of the Salt Lake High school alumni will be held this evening, in the Public Library auditorium and a special program has been prepared by Misses Virginia Brooks, Edna May and Anna Rogers. Officers for the ensuing year will be elected.

Money for the Destitute—The Returned Missionary society of the Elevventh ward have forwarded to S. W. Hedges, their missionary in Japan, \$101.50 for the destitute of the state in northern Japan. This is the result of the entertainment given in the ward in February and of subsequent donations.

Fined \$25 Each—Judge Willis Brown of the juvenile court yesterday fined Dahner & Co., who own a store on the corner of Seventh South and West Temple streets, and A. H. Dahl, who owns a cigar stand on the corner of Second South and State streets, the sum of \$25 each for selling tobacco and cigarettes to boys.

George Leslie Arrested—Deputy Sheriff Isaac H. Berry yesterday afternoon arrested George C. Leslie upon the charge of failing to support his children. Leslie resides just outside the city limits and the complaint against him was sworn to by his wife. He will be given a hearing this afternoon before Justice of the Peace Bishop.

New Juvenile Court—The mayor, city marshal and superintendent of schools of Murray, who, under the law, constitute the juvenile court commission of that city, met yesterday and appointed W. B. Erickson as judge of the new juvenile court. The court was organized there. Judge Erickson is a real estate man and is well known in Murray.

Driver Painfully Hurt—The delivery team belonging to Councilman Arthur Barnes ran away last evening in the north part of town, and the driver, Ernest Jacobs, was thrown out of the vehicle, run over and was painfully hurt. While going down the cane street hill, the nacksyoke broke and the horses could no longer be controlled. Little damage was done to the team or wagon, and young Jacobs is at work today as usual, but is sore from the effects of the accident.

Sights Surprised Him—A. C. Funkhauser of Challis, Ida., is in Salt Lake, the first time since 1859, when the town was hardly more than an overgrown village. Mr. Funkhauser was very much astonished at the electric cars, the street lights and automobiles and imagines if these surprises keep on accumulating by the time he gets back east, he will be completely overwhelmed. He left Kansas for Idaho 47 years ago and is 73 years old. Mr. Funkhauser is a miner by occupation and is well to do.

Will Open April 15—T. H. Fitzgerald of Green River, Utah, is in the city, and says the proposed local townsite will be opened April 15, and that the town will have a population of 2,000 by October. An irrigation dam and plant will be built, and Mr. Fitzgerald claims that the region will surpass even Mesa Verde, Colo., in fruit growing, and that Green River fruit can be placed on the market three weeks ahead of the Mesa Verde article. The Green River Land and Townsite commission is building a stern wheel steamer for passenger and freight business on the river, with the intention also of handling the tourist traffic to the Grand canyon.

TRACKLAYING ON LINE TO ELY, NEV.

Grading is Now Completed on The 140-Mile Southern Pacific Feeder.

PUT DOWN STEEL YESTERDAY.

From Now on Work Will be Rushed With Prospects of Completion July 1.

(Special to the "News.") Ogden, March 2.—O. C. Larsen, formerly connected with the Southern Pacific here, but now with the Nevada & Northern at Coburn, Nev., arrived in Ogden yesterday for a week's visit with relatives. Mr. Larsen states that the laying of steel commenced yesterday out of Coburn, on the line running to Ely, a distance of 140 miles, upon which nearly all the grading has been completed. The company expects to lay the rails at the rate of one and one-half miles per day. Material with which to complete 80 miles of track is now on hand at Coburn and an additional amount to cover another 25 miles is now en route. At Coburn awaiting the completion of the line to be shipped to Ely, is the machinery for a smelting plant that will be erected at Ely as soon as it can be transported to that point. It is expected that the line to Ely will be completed by July 1, after which an additional 10 miles running to the mines will be laid. The latter stretch is said to run through a location which will necessitate the handling of a great deal of rock by the builders.

OPEN TO INDIAN SPRINGS. Salt Lake Route Branch From Las Vegas Now Being Operated.

Los Angeles, Cal., March 1.—Forty-three miles of working line was added to the Salt Lake railroad system today, when the new line building from Las Vegas to Tonopah was opened as far as Indian Springs. Both passenger and freight business is being transacted now over that part of the branch, and as fast as the work of construction is completed at stations further on the trains will extend their runs.
