

TELEGRAPHIC. ELECTION RESULTS.

**Republicans Gain Five U. S. Senators
and Democrats Lose Three.**

PRESIDENT CLEVELAND'S VIEW.

**Summary Chief Stabbed to an Election
Wreath—Comments by the
London Press.**

WASHINGTON, D. C., Nov. 6.—As a result of the latest election returns, the Republicans gain five U. S. Senators, two from Utah and one each from Kentucky, Ohio, and Maryland, and the Democrats lose three Senators, one each from Maryland, Kentucky and Ohio. None of these changes become effective, however, until March 1, 1897, except in the case of the two Utah senators who will take their seats as soon as chosen. Thereafter the Democratic strength in the Senate will be as follows: Republicans, 44; Democrats, 38; Populists, 1; Greenback, (Dissident), 1. Thus, if the Delaware vacancy is filled by a Republican, it will give a Republican majority in the upper branch of Congress.

RESULTS OVER THE RETURN.

CLEVELAND, Nov. 6.—The Daily News's Washington reporter says: "President Cleveland is in charge of none of the results of yesterday's election to his administration. On the contrary, he is taking a quiet smile over certain features of the returns."

The President and every member of the cabinet took a deep interest to the result of the election in Ohio, and express regret at its outcome.

WINNING IN AN ELECTION WRANGLE.

NEW YORK, Nov. 6.—John H. McDonald, clerk of the Supreme court and secretary of Tammany Hall, is in a dangerous condition at the time of the election, having been the victim of a severe stroke, although the affair is said to have occurred at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon. No report was made of it, and the first intimation of it was had when William Dowling, a bartender, was found dead in his room at the Hotel Astor, mortally, charged with having stabbed McDonald. The patrolmen who had Dowling in charge would say nothing to the case, and even tried to conceal it from the magistrate.

Officer and his wife were killed on the street and Dowling was on the street and trying to arrest Dowling, who he said had hit him on the head with a pipe.

"That is all there is to it," concluded the officer.

John H. McDonald, police surgeon, who examined McDonald, made the following report of the case: This is to certify that John H. McDonald is suffering from a punctured wound, which has penetrated the right thoracic cavity, and has caused death. His condition is very critical and fatal complications may arise."

GOV. ALBRIGHT EXPLAINS.

He Has His Share of the Election Blame.

SPRINGFIELD, Ill., Nov. 6.—It is the belief of Gov. Albright that the great Republican landslide of yesterday was brought about mainly by the national stimulation and the guiding hand of the administration in Wall Street. The Democratic convention, in many instances, were backed by politicians and members of the administration, who forced the adoption of Cleveland's policy on the money question. The governor was asked what he thought about the results of yesterday's election.

"Oh, he answered, with a broad smile, "it is not our place to say so. We have not yet laid out, and you know that in politics usually it is regarded as bad form for a corps to indulge in such talk while the wake is in progress." Then, when the governor finished his speech, he turned to the reporter and said: "How will this affect the silver movement?"
