LOCAL AND OTHER MATTERS.

**Home Mission.**—There will be a meeting of the Home Missionaries of this State, on Wednesday evening, the 25th inst, at 7 o'clock.

**Priesthood Meeting.**—There will be a meeting of the Priesthood of this State on Saturday, June 5th, 1880, at 11 a.m., in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall.

**Returning.**—Mr. S. H. Kennedy, the noted Sheep-dip manufacturer, arrived in the city yesterday on his return home from a business trip to the north-west.

**Closing.**—The Deseret University closes with this week's labors until fall. The students will recuperate, after the time of examination, by spending Friday at Calder's Farm.

**"Our."** The Box Office will be open to-morrow morning for the sale of tickets for Friday night's performance. The prospects are for a splendid house. Secure seats early.

**To-Night.**—This evening at 7.30 p.m., in the 11th Ward School House, the officials of the Utah Southern Railroad Company intend to lay the project before the public and canvass for support therefor. Attend, listen, and subscribe for stock.

**A Popular Resort.**—The Utah Western Railroad Company will run four trains to Black Rock on Decoration Day, and many will doubtless take this opportunity of beginning the season's excursions to that popular resort. The water will be too good for bathing, but there are various conveniences enabling one to spend the day pleasantly.

**Coming.**—Decorations Day is approaching. One might know this, by watching the sky. The clouds are beginning to soak the ground with the inevitable shower. This does the blue mingled with the gray, and with the muddy mixture thus compounded, cement anew the periodical bond of union.

**Museum.**—The curator has received from the Peabody Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology, Cambridge, Mass., the 12th and 13th annual reports of 1879 and 1880. A fine Indian mill or meal stone has been presented by Wm. H. Bligh, Esq., Payson, and specimens of black-making sand, clays, etc., by Mr. H. H. Hays, 21st Ward.

**Shakespeare Award.**—Bismann, the celebrated German tragedian, who appeared in this city several years ago, and delighted the public with his fine impersonations of Shakespearean characters, is engaged to perform here for three nights, beginning on Monday the 7th of June. He will be supported by some of the members of the Home Dramatic Club and other artists, and will open with his noted play of "Macbeth," followed by "Richard III."

**"Shooting a Curtain."**—An incident occurred in a ward entertainment some time ago, which, though not on the programme, was perhaps more natural and effective than anything else represented during the evening. A lady whose husband was acting as manager, went down from the stage into the auditorium to speak to a friend, and just as the curtain was about to descend on a tableau, started to return. She reached the platform when the drop was half way to the floor, but thinking to accomplish her object before it fell, she lowered her head and struggled to make her way under. Her husband seeing her danger, rushed to the rescue, and raising his pointed bow far above his head, wildly exclaimed "Shoo! Shoo!" But the curtain wouldn't "shoo" worth a cent, and struck the good lady and her worthy lord across their necks, with force enough to remind them of the palmiest days of the guillotine in the French Reign of Terror. The unexpected denouement, it is needless to say, was highly appreciated by all present, except the two performers.

**Sub-irrigation.**—This morning, while the pleasure of examining and witnessing the operation of an ingenious apparatus for sub-irrigation purposes, invented by a Mr. Hamilton of Los Angeles, California, and now sold by the Astorian Sub-irrigation Company of this city. Messrs. Hamilton and Grove, representing the company, are staying in Salt Lake a week or two for the purpose of exhibiting the machine, explaining their system of irrigation, and selling rights of use to parties desiring to purchase. Their machines may be seen at Morris and Evans' yard at the rear of Z. C. M. I., and will well repay a visit of inspection. They are for pipe making, and by a simple and ingenious process may turn out from 1,200 to 1,800 feet of concrete pipe per day. This, after being hardened in the sun, is laid along the bottom of trenches in orchards, lawns, vineyards or other lands, and covered over with soil. Water may thus be conducted in any required direction, evaporation entirely obviated, and thorough irrigation insured, as the moisture, instead of being on the surface, is sent down among the roots of plants where it is most needed, and made to percolate the surrounding soil from beneath. The pipe is made of lime, clay and cement, and after a few hours' exposure to the sun, becomes very hard and firm in texture, so that it would be impossible for leakage to occur.

It may be of any size, from two inches to five feet in diameter, and will conduct with security various sized streams of water any required distances. As the advantages of sub-irrigation over surface irrigation become more generally demonstrated, the utility and convenience of the system adopted by the Astorian Company will undoubtedly win for it a well deserved popularity.

**City Council.**—The City Council convened in regular session on Tuesday, May 25th, 1880, Alderman Dinwoodey presiding.

A petition was submitted, signed by Thomas Cannell and 21 others, residents and taxpayers of the 10th Ward, setting forth that they would greatly be accommodated if the Council would instruct the Supervisor to build a foot bridge across the canal at the intersection of South Temple and Seventh West Streets, and repair the main bridge over said canal, which is in an impassable condition at that point. Referred to the committee on streets and alleys.

H. Pembroke petitioned for the right to use a portion of the street on the northeast corner of Second West and Second North streets for the purpose of piling building material thereon, for a period of seven or five days. Granted under the usual restrictions.

A petition was received, signed by W. H. Robertson, per C. H. Dodge, representing that he had a small exhibition of mechanical figures known as the "Blacksmith's Dream," made and invented by him, and that he desired to exhibit the same for a small admission fee, and the ordinance required the sum of \$5 to be paid for each exhibition. The ordinance was amended to exhibit free, or at a reduced rate of license. License granted for \$3.

A petition was submitted from Samuel Khan, president, and Bernard Loth, secretary of the congregation of B'nai Israel, setting forth that the St. Mark's Episcopal congregation of this city has resolved to purchase a lot of land, and to build a synagogue on the same, and to title whatsoever all claim and title whatsoever to all lands heretofore granted by the city to them as a burying ground, on condition that said lands be ceded to the Jewish congregation aforesaid. The petitioners therefore prayed that the former grant to the St. Mark's Episcopal congregation be annulled and rescinded, and a new grant for the same be made to the congregation B'nai Israel. Petition granted, and the Mayor authorized to give a grant for said land to the petitioners.

The committee on finance, to whom was referred the report of the committee on construction of the Jordan and Salt Lake City Canal, showing the amount expended thereon during the month of April, reported that they had found the same correct, and recommended the acceptance of said report and that it be placed on file.

The committee on public grounds reported adversely upon the petition of J. M. Russell, who asked the privilege of purchasing land located on the north bench of the city, as it was their opinion that the city ought not to dispose of land in that locality at present. Adopted.

The committee on enrollment reported that a resolution entitled "A resolution providing for the issue of bonds to construct a canal and other works to supply Salt Lake City with water, adopted by the council on the 21st inst.," had been correctly enrolled, signed by the Mayor, and filed in the office of the City Recorder. Report received and filed.

The committee on streets and alleys, to whom was referred the petition of P. O. Thomasson and 164 others, in relation to a footpath in continuation of Wall Street, and leading over the bench from City Creek Cañon to the Seventeenth Ward, reported that they had examined into the matter, and would recommend that when the parties whose land the desired right of way passes through shall have vested the title thereto in the corporation of Salt Lake City, a four rod street be declared open. It was moved that this report be adopted, whereupon a spirited discussion was indulged in by the members of the Council. It was elicited from remarks upon the subject, that the Trustee-in-Trust had granted to Mr. Farley F. Pratt a certain three cornered tract of land, owned by the Church and lying directly north of the land owned by Dr. Park, at the mouth of City Creek Cañon. That said Pratt had built a house upon the land so granted, which house was located in such a position as to obstruct the footpath used by citizens who travel to and from the upper portions of the Nineteenth and Twentieth Wards. That this footpath had been used for a number of years by said citizens, although located upon land belonging to the Church, and that some of the citizens had interviewed the Trustee-in-Trust and obtained from him a grant for the right to continue using the footpath.

On the other hand it was remarked that the present footpath was located upon an extremely precipitous and impracticable route, and one which, if a road should be opened thereon for teams, could hardly be made accessible, while a short distance to the north was a route more feasible, easier of access and with a pleasant and more practicable route either for a footpath or a wagon road, and one which would not interfere in the least with the rights of other citizens. And it was believed that the Trustee-in-Trust would hesitate to grant the right of way for this latter route by far the better one of the two. Finally the motion to adopt the report was amended, and a resolution was adopted to table was made and carried.

On motion, a committee of three, consisting of Aldermen Calder, Fryer and Shedd, was appointed to confer with a committee of the same number appointed by the County Court and wait upon the board of directors appointed by the last legislature, to establish an asylum, with a view to offering a suitable location within Salt Lake County, for the Territorial Insane Asylum. An appropriation of \$10 was made to reimburse the currency received by the treasurer, and the committee on finance were instructed to count the currency, and if found correct to destroy it.

Adjourned to next Tuesday evening at the usual hour.

**Police Court.**—Two men were arrested, to-day, for engaging in a fight.

A woman for drunkenness and for breaking the windows of the jail, also became an inmate of the city jail.
