University, and more especially designed to cast discredit and suspicion on its president, General Howard, have submitted their return, together with a statement of the present financial condition of the institution. stitution. Among other demands, they say the recorded proceedings of the board of trustees will show that no single dollar of the University money was ever voted as a gratuity to General Howard, nor any money at any time under any pre-text to which he was not justly en-titled in consideration for valuable and indispensable services faithfully rendered, and there is nothing mysterious or difficult to explain in the present condition of the Howard University. The report is signed by Fredk. Douglass and Geo. C. Baker, the Rev. Ezra Whipple, the other member of the committee, being absent from the city. There is
