WM. ABRAHAM M. P.

Noted Welshman to be Given a Reception Here Next Week.

Rt. Hon. William Abraham, M. P., of Wales, who was a foreign delegate to the Federation of Labor convention at San Francisco, will be in the city next week, and is to be given a public reception by the Cambrian society. There will be a select program, consisting of Welsh songs and speeches by prominent

The November issue of the Cambrian

of Utica, N. Y., has the following about the noted Welsh author:

William Abrahum, M. P., is attending the annual convention of the American Federation of Labor at San Francisco in company with Mr. Wignall of Swansea, S. W., both elected as British delegates by the trades congress of Great Britain, which met recently at Leeds, Abraham receiving 11,000 votes He is self-educated and a graduate from the mine, and one of the veteran members of the British parliament, where he has more than held his own for twenty years. At the last general election he was elected by a majority of 6,509 votes, the largest majority received by any member in the United Kingdom. The experiment of labor representation having proved successful, it is probable that the number of labor representatives will be gradually increased. Abraham is the pioneer of this departure in British politics, and is

naturally at the head of the labor faction in the house.
"In 1873 he was a miner in the Rhendda valley, when he was elected secre-tary of the Old Miners' association. In 1875 he was elected vice president. raham has been for years president of the South Wales federation. He is also treasurer of the Miners' federation of Great Britain, with a membership of 400,000, and a member of the special committee of the three fraternal delegates to settle disputes. At the head of the South Wales miners, numbering 150,000, he has revealed his superb abilftles as an organizer and safe leader. He is not a politician, but simply a labor man in parliament and out, and is always for peace.'
