EVANSTON MAN INJURED BY DYNAMITE

Frank Arlett, Victim of Missed Shot, Brought to Ogden Hospital.

OGDEN, Oct. 13.—Frank Arlett, a young man of Evanston, Wyo., was the victim of a delayed dynamite explosion yesterday noon, while working in a rock quarry near Evanston. He had prepared a number of shots, one of which failed to go off. The young man went forward to light other shots, and when within a few feet of the charge it exploded and he was buried many feet into the air. One of his arms was broken, and it is feared he suffered internal injuries. He was brought into Ogden yesterday afternoon on the fast mail and taken to the hospital.

OGDEN, Oct. 13.—The police report that the past three or four days a number of business men of Ogden have been victimized by a clever woman gifter who, by her pitiful story of a dying mother in a small town further west and her need to reach her next side has in most cases succeeded in swindling the money which it is said ranges from a few dollars to amounts as large as \$40. The woman is described as of large build and well dressed. She claims to have lost her job after arriving in Ogden and has reached her dying mother another less charitable ones help her. The character of her appeal was learned from a banker in Salt Lake, who is reported to have been one of the woman's victims. Through the Salt Lake local people have been notified to watch for the woman.

SUIT FOR DIVORCE.

TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

OGDEN, Oct. 13.—A teachers' institute of the Weber county pedagogues will be held at the Weber county high building on Saturday next, Oct. 18. Superintendent Eggersen states that the school attendance is greatly in excess of last year, and that the students are taking more interest with a vim and earnestness than has been shown in previous years. Saturday is also day for the county teachers, and it is estimated that \$5,000 will be paid out by the clerk on that day. PROHIBITION A SUCCESS IN GARFIELD

Mayor Thomas Sevy Tells Provo Inter-viewer of the Benefits of Temperance Reform.

PROVO, Oct. 13.—Mayor Thomas Sevy of Pauperville was a Provo visitor yesterday. In an interview he stated that he was pleased to see a strong prohibition sentiment in Provo, and speaking of prohibition in Garfield County said: "We have triple prohibition in our county four years now, and for the last three years I can assure you it has been a success. Any one who has come into our county since we enforced prohibition will agree with us that the country is at least ten per cent better off than it was before. We had about one year of the four when prohibition was not considered successful; but that was simply because the officers did not enforce the law. They closed the front doors of saloons but the back doors stood open. Prohibition is a success in our town and county because the laws are enforced. I hope you succeed in adopting it here."

NEPHI REPUBLICANS NOMINATE FULL TICKET

NEPHI, Oct. 12.—The Republican municipal convention was held Monday evening and the formulated plan of action during the coming municipal campaign with especial reference to the prohibition question. The ordinance passed by the present city council received consideration, and the general sentiment was that the policy of high license be continued and given a fair trial.

A committee of five consisting of W. E. Watson, P. M. Nease, W. D. Candland, S. E. Jensen and Thomas Headley, was appointed to draw up resolutions defining the position of the Republican party, and it was instructed to incorporate the action of the city council on the \$2,000 liquor license ordinance, and that the Republican party pledge itself to see that the ordinance is upheld and sustained.

A motion to start a citizens' movement was defeated.

On Saturday evening a convention of the Republican party will be held when the resolution referred to will be presented and candidates named.
