PROHIBITION A SUCCESS IN GARFIELD

Mayor Thomas Sevy Tells Provo Interviewer of the Benefits of Temperance Reform.

PROVO, Oct. 12.—Mayor Thomas Sevy of Paiguitch was a Provo visitor yesterday. In an interview he stated that he was pleased to see a strong prohibition sentiment in Provo, and speaking of prohibition in Garfield county said: "We have tried prohibition in our county four years now, and for the last three years I can assure you it has been a success. Anyone who has come into our county since we enforced prohibition will agree with us that the county is at least 100 per cent better off than it was before. We had about one year of the four when prohibition was not considered successful, but that was simply because the citizens did not vote the law. They closed the front doors of the saloons, and left the back doors open. Prohibition is a success in our town and county because the law is enforced. I hope you succeed in adopting it here."
