Unfortunately for Burns he was sandwiched in the speaking between Lord Alverstone and E. Mostyn Pigott, two of London's best after-dinner speakers. There was compensation in the fact, however, that Lord Alverstone, who was a great athlete in his younger days, went over to Burns, and, shaking him by the hand, said that he was pleased to meet a man who had played the game as cleanly as Burns had.
