

CHICAGO'S GREAT FIRST WARD BALL

It Was as Vicious and Indecent
And Redolent of Ribaldry
As Ever It Was.

NO ORDER OR RESPECT OF LAW

An Alderman Immaculately Attired,
Led the Grand March—Place
Jammed to Suffocation.

Chicago, Dec. 15.—The Record-Herald in a news article describing the much-advertised first ward ball last night, says:

The first ward ball, stripped of none of its viciousness and none of its indecency and with all the revelry, ribald song, clinking glasses, popping corks and immodest exposure of former years last night had a record-breaking attendance.

Those organizations that started out to suppress the ball failed in making any noticeable inroads into the fact that some levee each year on reputable and respectable. Instead, hundreds of persons who never before had the temerity to attend the ball turned out last night as a matter of curiosity.

With the first ward aldermen the first action is "results." And the results last night were, to them, the most gratifying that the ball has ever known.

There were absentees, of course, and chief among these were public officials who in former years have paraded themselves at the ball. But the crowd was there in point of numbers. That was nothing, although in the matter of "class" the ball may be said to have been deficient.

At midnight, when an alderman attired immaculately, led the grand march of the denizens of the shameful district of Chicago, the Coliseum was jammed to suffocation with such a collection from the underworld as never before had gathered there. A cloud of smoke enveloped the ball-room floor, and in the long, wide aisles, the struggling mass of men and women, packed like sardines, appeared like an imaginary fringe on a huge star-colored pillow case flaring in a breeze.

Order? There was none. Respect for the law? There was none.

RICH AND POOR RUB EL-BOWS IN COMMON CAUSE

Westerner Says Society People Have "Nerves"
From Modern Conditions.
