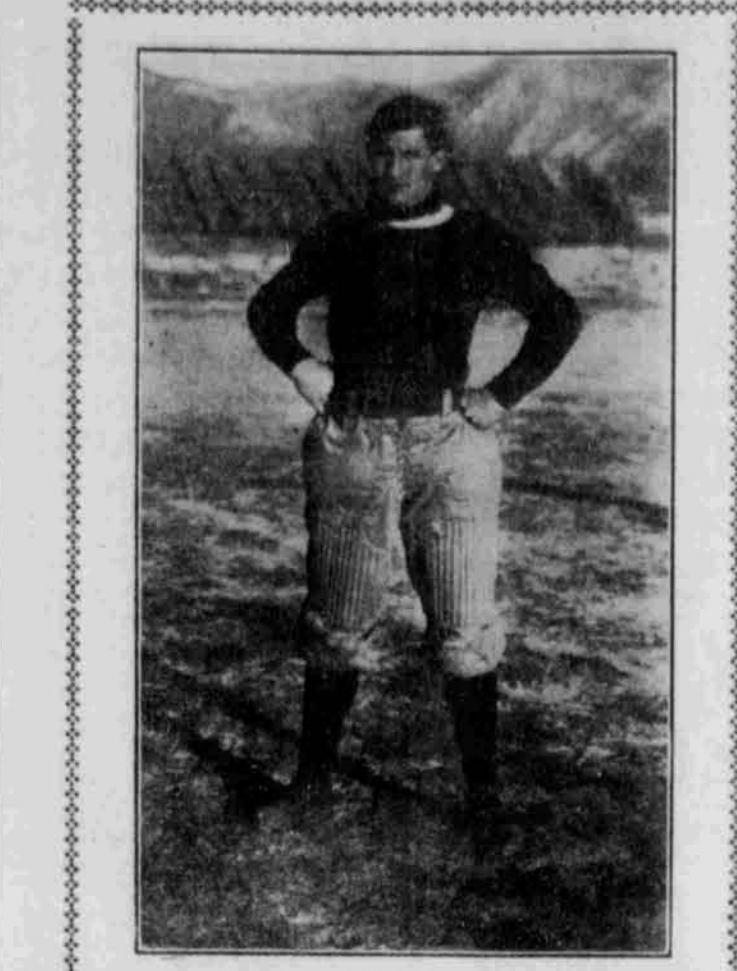

A.A.U. TO FIGHT OUTLAW LEAGUE

Sullivan Orders Schmidt to Disqualify Every Man Entering Event of New Organization.

New York, Oct. 19.—The Amateur Athletic Union of the United States is today no time in an effort to discourage the new outlaw athletic league, which was recently formed in Chicago. President James E. Sullivan of the A. A. U. has directed Otto E. Schmidt of the Central association, which is the controlling body at Chicago, to disqualify every man who competes in any event given by the new league and to have a registration committee in Chicago pass a resolution disqualifying all the men that participate in any such meeting.

In his letter to Mr. Schmidt, President Sullivan used strong language, declaring that if the outlaw league wants a fight, he will give them more than they expected and says that he does not propose to see another meet deteriorate to where it was 30 years ago.

"I rather welcome this incident, more than I regret it," said Mr. Sullivan in discussing his letter. "Athletics in the middle west are dormant and need stirring up. A little scrap like this will revive interest in the sport and be better for it and for all concerned. The parent body is in good fighting condition at present and there is not the slightest doubt that it will come out on top."

"SPIKER" TY COBB DEMANDS \$10,000
