LOCAL BRIEFS.

Pardon Board Meeting.—The State board of pardon is in session today at the state prison.

Parents' Class.—Tomorrow morning Dr. C. F. Wilcox will address the parents' class of the Twentieth ward Sunday school on the subject of "Food and Digestion."

Operation Performed.—Mrs. P. W. Dunwoody was operated upon this morning at the Grove's L. D. S. Hospital for appendicitis. The operation was performed by Drs. Allen Middleton and Sefton.

Accounts Audited.—The general committee of the G. A. M. Soldier War Veterans and Women's Relief corps met last night in the Federal building and settled all bills connected with the Linchday exercises in Army hall.

Exhibits Begins Tuesday.—Artists Haskins, Jensen, and later enter painters constructed "A Year in Liberty Park" will be placed on exhibition at the Commercial club next Tuesday morning, remaining there for 19 days.

Hotel Changes Hands.—Miss J. T. Dunham has bought from Richard Jones the three years' lease and furnishings of the Hotel Metropole on west Third South street for \$12,000. Mrs. Dunham will spend \$2,000 in refurbishing and remodeling.

Washington's Birthday Dance.—On the afternoon of Washington's birthday the Twentieth ward Sunday school will give a children's dance commencing at 2 p. m. Workmen Badly Hurt.—James E. Christensen of 452 Port street suffered an injury in which his hands were badly scalded yesterday afternoon, while operating a machine in the coal plant of the Utah Gas & Coke company. He was removed to the Grove's L. D. S. hospital where the thumb and three fingers of his left hand and the thumb of his right hand were amputated.

Held Bond Election.—An election will be held today to pass upon the bonding of the Granite school district for the amount of \$100,000. The polls open at 7 a. m. and close at 7 p. m. This amount is needed to erect new buildings at Holliday, East Mill Creek, Fourteenth and Main streets, Mill Creek, Pleasant View and Sage House. Additional rooms will be put on the Garfield and Hunter buildings.

The regular quarterly conference of the Granite Stake of Zion will convene at the Stake house on Sunday Feb. 21, at 10 a. m. Meetings will commence at 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. The saints are especially requested to be in attendance at the morning session.

The Granite stake priesthood meeting will be held at the Stake tabernacle on Saturday, Feb. 27, at 10 a. m. It is desired that the heads of all quorum stake and ward organizations be in attendance.

"That a filtration plant be installed in connection with the present water works system.

"That in the interest of cleanliness, health, fire protection and the maintenance of suitable water pressure in the water main a distributing reservoir or not less than 10,000 gallons capacity be constructed above Mt. Olivet cemetery for the distribution of the waters of Big Cottonwood and Parley's canyon creeks.

"That immediately following any favorable action of the court with regard to the right to enlarge the East Jordan canal that the work of construction be pushed to completion, so that the attorney having in charge the case may be instructed to obtain an action of the court as soon as possible.

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"That all automatic registering weirs be installed in CITY creek below the bridge tank to determine accurately the overflow at that point.

"That in consideration of the rapidly increasing demand made on the water mains of the upper distributing system taking water from CITY creek, and the utter impossibility of properly supplying those mains under the present conditions, a reservoir or head of the main distributing capacity be constructed at the intake of the high line and connecting with the Twentieth ward system. Such a reservoir would afford protection against fire in any part of the city.

"That the proposed storage reservoir near the forks of Parley's canyon be constructed.

"That to enable an accurate measurement to be made of the water received in the water distributing system from Big Cottonwood and Parley's canyons no automatic registering weirs be placed in Parley's creek immediately below the reservoir.

"That all automatic registering weirs be installed in CITY creek below the bridge tank to determine accurately the overflow at that point.

"That in the interest of economy, as well as good service, the city purchase the necessary horses and wagons for this department and make provision for their care.

"That the amount to be appropriated each year for the connection of the dead ends of the waterworks distributing system, and that this work be done as soon as possible. The importance of maintaining constant circulation in the water mains cannot be overestimated. The dead ends act as "mud drums," the water becoming stagnant and unfit for use in a short time.

"That automatic flush tanks be constructed at dead ends in the system.

"That a bulkhead be constructed across the screen at the brick tank to prevent the loss of water by percolating through at this point.

"That the present wooden flume connecting the screens with the brick tank in CITY creek be replaced by a concrete conduit.

"That the screens made be extended through the blocks in the water distribution district and hydrants be established thereon at suitable intervals for fire protection.

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
