

DROPOSALS for conveying the mails of the United States from the 1st of December, 1860, to the 1st of July, 1862, on the following route in the Territory of UTAH, will be received at the contract office of this department until 3 p. m. of the 29th of September next, to be decided by the 2d of October.

1280S From Carson Valley, (Genoa.) by Eagle; Washoe, Truckee, and Long Valleys, to Susanville, on reasonable terms. 125 miles and back, once in two weeks.

Leave Carson Valley every other Monday at S a. m;

Arrive at Susanville next Wednesday by 5 p. m; Leave Susanville every other Monday at 8 a. m; Arrive at Carson Valley next Wednesday by 5 p. m.

Bids for weekly trips are invited.

NOTES.

Proposals must be to carry the mail with "celerity, certainty, and security;" using the terms of the law, and they must be gurantied by two responsible persons, certified to as such by a postmaster or judge of a court of record.

No pay will be made for trips not performed, and for each of such omissions not satisfactorily explained three times the pay of the trip may be deducted. For arrivals so far behind time as to break connexion with depending mails, and not sufficiently excused, one fourth of the compensation for the trip is subject to forfeiture. Fines will be imposed, unless the delinquency be satisfactorily explained, for neglecting to take the mail from or into a post office; for suffering it to be injured, destroyed, robbed, or lost; and for refusing, after demand, to convey the mail as frequently as the contractor runs, or is concerned in running vehicles on the route. The Postmaster General may annul the contract for disobeying the post office laws, or the instructions of the department. He may alter the schedule, and also order an increase of service by allowing therefor a pro rata increase on the contract pay. He may also curtail or discontinue the service in whole or in part, at pro rata decrease of pay, allowing one month's extra compensation on the amount of service dispensed with.
