One thousand released French soldiers have arrived at Gluckstadt, the capital of Holstein, from Germany. A similar outbreak is expected this evening. Transports are in waiting to take them to France. Bismarck has written to Strasbourg that Germany will compensate the inhabitants of Alsace and Lorraine at the same rate as were accorded the inhabitants of those provinces when they were annexed, under similar circumstances, to France.

A dispatch from Bremen announces that the proposal of the French government to Germany for an increase in the number of French troops in Paris, in consequence of the disturbance in that city, has been agreed to. The German government has also promised, in case of disturbance beyond Paris, to place the departments occupied by the German troops in a state of siege.

WEST INDIES. Heated alive—Numerous murders.

HAVANA, 31.—A rumor here, generally credited, is that volunteers in the vicinity of San Juan de los Rameos, a small town, first running a stake through his body. It is said the volunteers were caught by the Spanish officers while engaged in the act of cruelty. The outrage has greatly incensed the people and many murders on both sides have resulted.

A Spanish gunboat left on Sunday for Nassau, with two persons on board who are intended for spies upon the expedition expected there. One is from the United States and one from Columbia.

A Spaniard, who was with the last convoy which conducted from Mauritania to Los Tunas a whole family, composed of men and women who lived on a farm called Ocajal, six miles from San Geronimo, informs us they were assassinated by the Spanish troops.

An expedition was safely landed on the southern coast near Trinidad. A whole company of Cubans was seen by our informant, well uniformed and armed.

MEXICO. Political matters.

CITY OF MEXICO, 24, 616 HAVANA.—The Mexican Congress is at a dead lock. The opposition have a majority of twelve, but are unable to accomplish their aim, because Juarez' deputies will leave the hall and prevent the necessary quorum. The forcible attendance of members is prohibited by the constitution. The solution of the difficulties have been partly defeated and the chances of Juarez are consequently strengthened. The attempt of the federalists to send the army from the capital resulted in the army adhering to Juarez unanimously. The Jalisco quarrel is unimportant. The Corone government generally wavers. Ex-Governor Corone ran away to the capital, after an armed encounter between both factions. Cuero has petitioned the federalists to pass a law, withdrawing the federal troops. The President's birthday was celebrated on the 31st, and the Emperor William's on the 32d. Many German and American flags were displayed. Congress has passed, to the first reading, a bill granting a pension of \$10,000 a year, by a 34 majority. Mariscal has been appointed Minister of Foreign Affairs, and Vetoxco Minister of the Interior. Salvarez has been transferred to the Ministry of Justice. Romero will probably go to Washington and Bayno will probably assume the Ministry of Finance.
