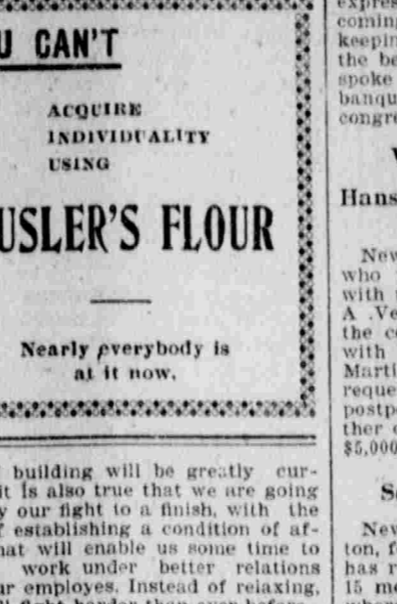
A BALLOON VOYAGE.

One Made Successfully from Paris To Hull, England.

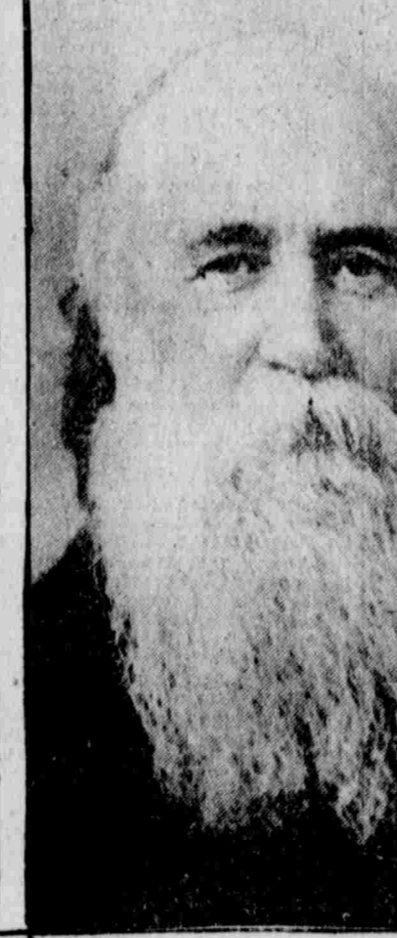
