GARDNER WILL GET CHANCE AT FITZ.

Arrangements Made for Battle Between the Pair for Light Heavyweight Championship.

TO FIGHT IN SAN FRANCISCO.

Will Take Place at Yosemite Club During Latter Part or November At 168 Pounds.

New York, Sept. 27.—At a conference held today at Bath Beach between Bob Fitzsimmons, Williame Pierce of Boston, manager for George Gardner, the light heavyweight champion of the world, and James C. Kennedy representing the Yosemite Athletic club of San Francisco, Fitzsimmons and Gardner were matched to fight at the Yosemite club the latter part of November for the title held by Gardner. The contest will be for 20 rounds at 168 rounds, the men to weigh in at 3 o'clock in the afternoon of the day of the battle. The purse will be divided, 75 per cent going to the winner and 25 per cent to the loser.

Edward Graney of San Francisco was chosen as referce and forfelt holder. It was stated at the conference that Fitz-simmons will leave for San Francisco early in October and go into active training for the fight, Gardner, who is in Texas with a theatrical enterprise, will cancel his engagement and proceed to the coast as soon as ossible.

A BALLOON VOYAGE.

One Made Successfully from Paris To Hull, England.

London, Sept. 27.-Count de La Vaulx and Count d'Outremont descended to-day in a bailoon near Hull, Yorkshire, having journeyed from Paris in 17% hours. This is the first time that a balloon has successfully traveled from

Count de La Vaulx is one of the best known French aeronauts. In August, 1902, he made the record balloon trip 1902, he made the record balloon trip for that year, having ascended from St. Cloud, near Paris, and landed at Opoes, Hesse, a distance of over 419 miles, which he covered in 19 hours.

In 1901, and again in 1902, accompanied by French warships, he made endeavors to cross the Mediterranean from pear Margailles to Algeria hall.

endeavora to cross the Mediterranean from near Marseilles to Algeria in balloons, with a view to demonstrating the possible utility in time of war. Both these efforts were unsuccessful.

Last January he sent a trial balloon from Gabes, in Tunis, across the desert of Sahara, with a view to ascertaining the feasibility of an aerial trip across the desert.
