He continued in that line of business in different parts of the Territory up to the day of his decease. As a miller he had few if any equals in the west, and he was reasonably and justly proud of his reputation in his line of busi-ness. His general course of life denoted that he was a man of large heart, which was especially manifested during the time of distress among the people of this Terri-tory, occasioned by the first grasshopper war, when the grain crops were destroyed. At that time of need he proved a friend indeed to many who, but for his aid, might have suffered for lack of bread.
