NEW YORK, 24.—Hoffman & Maclellan's Oriental Brewery, East 55th St., was burned last night. Loss \$50,000.

The telegram from Hong Kong received yesterday at the office of the Pacific Mail Steamship Company, announcing that the steamer *Alaska* is over due at that port three days in a voyage of eight from Yokohama, caused considerable excitement, especially among those interested in the stock of the company.

Coi. Juan Macias, English Minister of the Republic of Cuba, goes to Washington to-day to see the President and Secretary of State to explain the excited feeling in England about Cuban matters. It is stated that many prominent officials of Great Britain have requested Macias to make this visit.

As the steamer of the Atlantic Mail Line are not released from seizure, mails for Havana yesterday were deferred. The financial difficulty of the company is expected to be soon settled.

The Tribune expresses its anxiety at the probability of Tweed's escaping adequate punishment because of the bad way in which the case is managed.

CHICAGO, 24.—The great storm of yesterday evening continued in the line of fall of snow was the heaviest of the season and drifted into immense banks on the streets and along the railway lines. There is still nearly a complete blockade on all the railroads leading to the City.

A Washington special says of Stevenson's resolution, passed yesterday, for investigation into Congressional legislation in behalf of the Central Pacific, it is said to involve a large number of prominent Pacific Coast men; and among the names mentioned is that of Sargent. The same special says it is reported that Colfax will enter a suit against Ames for perjury.
