IRRIGATING A DESERT.

SENATOR JONES' SCHEME FOR RECLAIMING OR SUBMERGING THE GREAT COLORADO DESERT.

A Washington correspondent, under date of March 7th, writes as follows concerning the Colorado desert reclamation project: Senator Jones of Nevada has received full reports of the results of scientific explorations made at the expense of the United States. The citizens of California (William S. Chapman) last summer, for the purpose of ascertaining the practicability of reclaiming, and thus turning the Great Colorado desert into the waters of the Colorado river or the Gulf of California. The expedition, and an elaborate commentary upon it by E. Streich, an eminent civil engineer of San Francisco, furnish the following interesting information: The exploration of the Colorado desert, the Mojave valley and Death valley, which lie north of it, are from forty to one hundred feet below the level of the sea, and that this great desert, stretching from Lower California to Inyo county, in the State of California, and from the base of the Coast Range Mountains to the Colorado river, comprising an area about 300 miles long by 150 wide, may be converted into a chain of lakes or irrigated by the method above mentioned; also, that a large portion of this "desert" really consists of extremely fertile soil, being a deep alluvium susceptible of the highest cultivation. It is further shown that the prevalence of what are known as "sand storms," and hot, desiccating winds, and the deficient rainfall—the evils suffered by the surrounding country and as far north as the Tulare valley in California—are directly traceable to the existence of this desert, from which, as from a great furnace, there constantly rises, in the summer time, a vast volume of heated air without appreciable humidity. Thus the moisture of the rain bearing clouds which are blown northward during the summer months from the Gulf of California are dispatched as soon as they reach the borders of this superheated region, and prevented from reaching the dry and fertile plains of California beyond. The shells found on the surface of this desert, prove that it has been at one time the bed of a sea, and at a subsequent period the bed of a fresh water lake. The shorelines of lakes and seas have been seen and recognized in many places, and Mr. Streich expresses the opinion that the Arctian civilization of the adjacent region in Arizona (of which there are so many traces) came to an end in consequence of the climatic changes caused by the evaporation of these vast lakes in Southern California, after the Colorado river had cut down its bed in the great canon so deep that the course was diverted at Colville (California) to a southerly direction. The question is suggested whether these desert lands cannot be reclaimed by irrigation, and thus saved instead of being totally submerged, as it is considered certain that covering them with vegetation would tend to prevent the evaporation of moisture, and at the same time act as a precipitant for whatever moisture the atmosphere might carry; or whether both plans might not be combined. Senator Jones expresses the opinion that, although either course would involve large expenditures of money, the matter is of such public interest as to be worthy of investigation by the government, which alone has the necessary resources and appliances at command for the thorough and complete examination of the subject. If by such an examination, the feasibility of the work should be demonstrated, private capital might be found to undertake it. He has also been bringing the matter to the attention of Congress with a view to having a survey made by the government.

BEHIND THE SCENES.—Sothorn, in an interview in *After-Dinner*, says: "Does acting pay? Well, indeed, it does. Until, within the last two years, I have never given myself more than four weeks' rest in a year. I have advised the great and the small of my profession, because my labor is heavier than the public know anything about. I will give the work of one day when there is a rehearsal. This was to arrive at the mere question of getting the words into my head, and the analysis of the character being another thing to do afterwards. I have had to study all day when I was not rehearsing or acting, and to go straight through a long rehearsal at night and stay up till three and four and five in the morning; I have been obliged to get up at eight o'clock the same morning, read my parts over again, and go to a rehearsal at ten o'clock. I got my memory so well cultivated that I at last would get my words to read through a long rehearsal, without ever having seen the words myself, and got through it actually every word."

FATAL RITE OF A CAT.—The Concord (N. H.) *Monitor*, of a late date, says: "On the 21st of February, Dr. J. W. C. of this city, was called to see Mrs. M. Croucher, who resided on Walnut street. She had been seen by two other physicians who pronounced her case one of hysteria, after a hasty diagnosis. Her pulse indicated seventy on that day. Dr. W. made a thorough diagnosis, pronounced the symptoms those of hydrophobia, and in the course of a day or two afterward, learned that the woman, when residing in Hoots, seventeen months before, had been scratched and bitten by a cat. She continued to grow worse daily, and died on the 6th of March. A terrible agony, manifesting all the marked and positive features of hydrophobia. She was only fifteen years of age. At the time she was bitten, her mother was nursing a child, it is said, and when the child was weaned, the hydrophobia manifested itself."
