

DANGER FROM EXECUTIVE POWER

Ex-Secy. Shaw Points Out How An Unscrupulous President Might Perpetuate Himself.

PUBLIC OPINION IS CHANGING

Trend of Times Toward Political Bossism—People Inclined to Hold Executive Responsible for Legislation.

Chicago, May 22.—Former Secy. of the Treasury Leslie M. Shaw delivered an address today before the convention of the National Electric Light Association. He said in part:

"In several of the states the people are holding the executive responsible for legislation and are demanding that it coerce the legislative department, if necessary, and are giving it all the credit for such legislation as is enacted. No man is responsible for this sentiment. It is a part of the evolution of the times. The trend of the times is toward political bossism.

"He who through love of power reaches out his hand to crush a business opponent is universally considered worthy of the penitentiary, while they who would through love of power reach both hands to crush political opponents are recipients of the highest praise from the press, pulpit and the people.

"Until recently we have had the benefit of a progressive and a conservative party. But now both political parties have become progressive, if not radical. For the first time in human history a great English-speaking people is without conservative leadership. I have never ceased to be thankful that a minority has always stood ready to challenge the majority, but there is now no challenging party.

"A few months ago the largest capitalized corporation on the globe sent its representative to the chief executive of the United States, asking permission to take over its principal competitors. It is currently reported that permission was granted and so far as I know the American people approve. I have no hesitancy in saying that this is the only first class country in the world where permission could have been obtained from the executive department of the government. Anywhere else such a case would have been answered, 'Go consult your lawyer.'

"I am expressing no opinion as to the wisdom or want of wisdom of such procedure. I am simply citing instances to illustrate the operation of the law of evolution which carries us onward, and undoubtedly in the main toward better things.

"Every condition, however, is fraught with danger. The pessimist is never without foundation for his fears or the optimist for his hopes. I am an optimist, but I want to emphasize the fact that a designing, unscrupulous and ambitious executive, clothed with authority to fix rates, to determine the tenure of corporations and business combinations, and to grant or withhold franchises would be in a position to perpetuate himself and his friends in office as long as he was willing to accept political support as the price of immunity. I want to suggest that it is wise to protest against the day when the demagogue shall be exalted."

THE EMPIRE CARRIED CHEESE, NOT RIFLES

San Francisco, May 22.—After deliberating for five hours, a jury in the United States district court today decided that it was cheese and not rifles, that the steamer Empire carried from San Francisco to the revolutionists in Central America in May, 1906, and found Harry J. Hart and Captain N. W. Liberoth not guilty of conspiracy against the neutrality laws of the United States.

The jury, however, brought in a verdict of guilty on the other two counts in the indictment, charging Liberoth as master of the Empire, with having failed to file a manifesto of the cargo with the collector of customs and with having left the port without clearance papers.

TO STURDY AMERICAN FORESTRY

San Francisco, May 22.—Dr. Takafusa Shijo, commissioner of forestry and secretary of the department of commerce of the Japanese imperial bureau at Tokyo has arrived from the orient. NEW DENVER AUDITORIUM

Contractors Will Have Great Convention Hall Completed By June 6.

THEN COMES THE CLEAN-UP.

All Water Connections Made—Roof Nearly Finished—Seats Are Arriving Daily.

Denver, Colo., May 22.—June 6 the contractors employed on the new Denver auditorium, where the Democratic convention is to be held July 7, will walk out of the building with their work complete.

It will take a week more to clean up and arrange the seats and do all the house setting, and then the big convention hall will be ready for the public.

The construction work is now going by leaps and bounds. One force of men is just completing the plastering. There is only one section of the ceiling left undone, and this will be completed by Monday night.

All water connections are made and a part of the plumbing is now in working order. The contractor has promised that the last water pipe will be connected and in operation by May 25.

The roof is almost finished. If it is not complete by Saturday night there will not be more than a day's work left. The electric wiring of the building is leaving a trail of sparks.

The floors in the main auditorium are complete and the floors of the basement and ante-rooms will be finished in another week. The stairs, doors and entrances will be finished by Saturday, but by a week from Saturday night they should be very nearly in working shape.

The galleries are practically finished now, and the seating is being arranged. The boxes will not be ready before Thursday or Friday of next week.

The very last work will be in the basement, and at the entrances. The contractors hope to have nearly all the work on of the main auditorium by Thursday and hustling to finish the basement.

The domes of the exterior will probably require another week for completion, but while the outside of the building is being finished workmen will clear away the remaining debris.

Today a full force of men is endeavoring to get the wings and moving floors connected with the machinery which handles them. This will require possibly seven days, but when once finished the hall can either be made into a splendid theater or a great room seating 14,000 persons. The machinery is already practically in place for hoisting and moving.

All of the necessary material for the finishing is now on hand, save the seats, and these are arriving daily by consignments.

At the outside calculation the completion of the auditorium will beat the date of the Democratic convention by at least 20 days.

STERLING RETURNS A LIBERAL

London, May 22.—The bye-election today in the Sterling district of Scotland to replace the late Premier Sir Henry Campbell-Bannerman, resulted in the return of Arthur Ponsonby, Liberal, who was secretary to Sir Henry, by the greatly increased majority of 1,351. This and other recent Scottish bye-elections seem to indicate that Scotland is not influenced by the tide against the Liberals, probably because the economic and education bills do not offend Scotland.

SOUTHERN STATES REPRESENTATION

House Passes the Crumpacker Amendment to Publicity Bill Which Would Reduce It.

HAS NO TERRORS FOR SOUTH.

Sharp Williams Says to Make Reduction, and Welcome, But Be Honest About It.

Washington, May 22.—The bill requiring publicity for campaign contributions was passed by the house today by a vote of 160 to 125, with the Crumpacker amendment added.

The amendment would have the effect of reducing congressional representation in the southern states. It is believed the bill will not pass the senate.

The bill provides for publicity of contributions made for the purpose of influencing elections at which representatives in Congress are elected, with what is known as the Crumpacker amendment, prohibiting fraud in registrations and providing data for a reduction of representation among the states.

Mr. Crumpacker explained his amendments by saying they were designed against fraud and intimidation in elections.

"They surround the ballots in the selection of members of the house," he said, "with sufficient safeguards to warrant their purity."

In the opinion of Tucker (Mo.), if anything were lacking to demonstrate to every man in the United States that the leaders and managers of the Republican party in the house were guilty of deceit and false pretense, the bill under discussion supplied that want.

"It is horseplay," remarked Mr. Hardwick (Ga.). Reduction in representation, he said, had no terrors for the south. The Republicans, he asserted, need not deceive themselves on that point. "Heavy as is the price," he exclaimed, "unfair and unjust as we believe it would be to exact this price of flesh and yet if the people of America ever do require it, they will find that the south will pay it for protection of its homes and for the preservation of its white civilization."

Mr. Lusk (Va.) protested against the measure, and Mr. Gillespie (Tex.) warned the house that by passing the bill the condition of the negro would be made worse than at present.

Following the remarks by Messrs. Bennett (N. Y.) and Bonnyne (Colo.), in support of the bill, Mr. Williams (Miss.) made a vigorous speech against it. "The great old party," he began, "has resolved itself into a sordid stock company." He charged the Republicans with not daring to face any public question in a fair and straightforward way, by combining several questions in one bill.

"What are you trying to do?" he inquired. "Does the gentleman from Indiana think he can turn the hands of the clock of time back half a century? Does he think he can produce the days of the carpetbagger and reconstruction in the south once more? Does he think the business interests of the north will stand for a recurrence of the saturnalia?"

The reduction in representation amendment, he declared, had been added to defeat the publicity bill. "You have no idea of reducing the representation of California, Massachusetts or Connecticut, because they disfranchise illiterates."

The people of the south, he asserted, were willing to take the issue. If, he said, it was decided to ignore the fifteenth amendment and the Republicans were willing to restore to Mississippi the power to elect, he suggested along racial lines, the people of that state were ready for the gauntlet. "Throw it down whenever you please," he exclaimed.

"As to the reduction of our representation in Congress," he said, "in God's name take it, and welcome to it; but be honest when you do it."

"Will damn your Republican party and be worse for you than the former bill which defeated Harrison," and he said to the Republicans, "like children you are playing with fire in a powder magazine."

He closed by asking the Republicans if they were fools enough to believe that the south would ever again submit to the policies to which she submitted when she was weak and helpless.

Mr. Dalzell (Pa.) brought the debate to a close in most vigorous fashion. It was a notorious fact, he said, that representation was reduced by the vote of the population had no relation to each other. He evoked Republican applause when he produced statistics showing that the representative from the First Mississippi district "sat here by virtue of 2,562, while the representative of the First district of Pennsylvania sits here by virtue of 29,700 votes."

There was not, he alleged, a representative "or an alleged representative," from Mississippi in the house who had any opposition to his election. The total vote, he said, that sent eight men to the house from the state of Mississippi, 19,298, was less than the number of votes in a single ward in his own district.

"You call that representative government," he exclaimed. "Is it not a farce?"

"Not even the effrontery of Mr. Williams," he said, dared him to put in the record the number of votes by which he came to Congress from Mississippi. The vote being taken, the bill amid Republican applause and some Democratic hisses, was passed, with the Crumpacker amendment added, yeas, 160; nays, 125; present and not voting, nine.

PHILIPPINE ASSEMBLY.

Time of Adjournment Having Arrived, Gov. Gen. Calls Extra Session.

Manila, May 22.—The statutory time for the adjournment of the Philippine assembly having arrived with the work of that body incomplete, Gov. Gen. Smith has called a month's extra session. Prior to the adjournment of the regular session the radicals attempted to present a resolution favoring immediate independence but were headed off by the Conservatives under the leadership of President Osmeña. It is believed that the attempt to present the resolution will be renewed during the extra session. The Philippine commission has rejected the assembly bill providing for the teaching of the various Filipino dialects in the public schools and has substituted a bill creating an institute for the study of the dialects. Manuel Quenson, a member of the assembly, has been appointed delegate to the navigation congress to be held at St. Petersburg. He will sail tomorrow, accompanied by his secretary, Theodore Rogers.
