The New York Post, a few weeks ago, published an account of dividenits that had been paid by the leading mines of the country for six months, from which it appears that only one mine in a thousand pays any dividends at all, and that, taking the aggregate of paying mines, the divi-

dends do not amount to more than a fraction above two per cent. From this the taxes must be deducted. The San Francisco Chronicle remarks in this connection: "To the mass of miners, then, mining clearly does not pay," and declares that only one in 5,000 of those who make it pay, secures a fortune.
