

The German corvette *Victoria*, which recently started for the West Indies, on reaching Plymouth, was ordered to Malta, probably in connection with the naval demonstration of the Powers.

The German government has expelled from the country the Mormon missionaries making proselytes.

A Havana dispatch says: In a recent engagement on the river Mahay, insurgent officers Brigadier General Pepillo Medina and Col. Johnson, the latter a native of the United States, were killed by Spanish troops. The insurgent chief Juan Aleites and three of his followers surrendered with their arms at Bayamo. There were 61 deaths from yellow fever for the week ending Saturday last.

The weather in Ireland continues to be very fine. Hay is being speedily cut and saved. All the crops are maturing with unusual rapidity. In view of this some of the members of the Mansion House relief committee consider that their labors ought to be ended immediately.

The St. Petersburg *Golos* publishes an article which attracts considerable attention, advocating the liberty of the individuals in accordance with law.

Marquis Tzeng has advised the Chinese embassy here that he will arrive at St. Petersburg at the end of next week with the new Japanese minister.

A Greek decree of mobilization was to be issued to-day, and the chambers are to be summoned immediately. A loan of £600,000 will be obtained at Paris, and another of £200,000 is being negotiated.

The Powers will draw up an ultimatum summoning the Porte to fulfil within three weeks the Montenegro convention. In the event of refusal, a naval demonstration will take place.

The ship *Winchester* at Montreal, from Malta, with sugar for the St. Lawrence refinery, was wrecked in the Straits of Macassar. The cargo was valued at from \$180,000 to \$200,000. Insured.

An Italian subject has been arrested for being concerned in Socialist intrigues, and will be expelled from France.

The Paris *Rappel* professes to have received information from the best sources in Constantinople that Queen Victoria recently addressed an autograph letter to the Sultan imploring him in the interest of his empire to accede to the wishes of the Powers.
