

RAW MATERIALS DISPUTE UNSETTLED

Only Thing Determined at White House Dinner Was That Conferencees Must Get Together.

TARIFF MAKING IS TRADING.

Shrewdest Dealer and Strongest Section is Bound to Get the Best of the Argument.

Washington, July 21.—The much talked-of White House dinner-conference, at which the tariff conferencees and the president's closest advisers were brought together tonight, in the effort to settle differences regarding the tariff bill, ended at 11:30, with the discussion over raw materials no nearer adjustment than they were before the dinner invitations were issued.

Only one question was determined beyond appeal, and that was that the conferencees will have to settle their own differences.

Pains were taken to convey the impression that this decision is not indicative of any absence of appreciation of the president's efforts. It merely confirmed what the "older statesmen" had asserted from the first—that tariff making is trading, and the shrewdest dealer and the strongest section is bound to get the best of the argument.

Representative Dwight, the Republican whip, spoke for the house at the dinner. He referred to the insurgent movement, organized by the "anti-free-trade" faction, but was not

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ready to estimate the strength of this element.

Representative Payne expressed the opinion that a conference report covering free iron ore, coal, hides and oil could be adopted in the house, but he said that he had not canvassed the situation.

Senator Aldrich was positive in the opinion that such a report would fail in the senate, but he thought there could be reductions made in the senate rates, with perhaps iron ore and oil transferred to the free list, without endangering its adoption.

Most of those present agreed with President Taft that the customs court should be situated in Washington, since it is to be a final court of appeal.

The discussion of the corporation tax dealt with the revenue it will produce and its general political effect.

Some of the conferencees said after the dinner that no conference report would be signed until both houses had been canvassed. No one can say how much this will delay adjournment. All the Republican conferencees were present at the dinner, with the exception of Senator Culion of Illinois. From the senate came Messrs. Aldrich, Hale, Burrows and Penrose. From the house

were Messrs. Payne, Dulzell, McCall, Boutwell, Caddenhead and Fordney.

To meet the conference the president invited Vice President Sherman, Secy. MacVeagh, Atty.-Gen. Wickersham, Speaker Cannon, Senator Granger, Senator Root and Representative Daly of New York.

The real discussion did not begin until after the dinner had been disposed of. It was said to have been one of the most carefully prepared banquets ever served from the famous old White House kitchen, and it was no fault of the president, his chef, or old Virginia "darky" if the conferencees were not in amiable mood when the meal was done.

COLONEL ROOSEVELT AMONG THE HIPPOPOTAMI

Naivasha, British East Africa, July 21.—Col. Roosevelt had an exciting experience yesterday while shooting hippopotami.

The natives became terrorized, but Mr. Roosevelt was not dismayed and, selecting the finest bull and the largest cow, killed them. Eventually the rest of the animals were driven off. Roosevelt arrived at camp at 6 o'clock this morning, after towing home the spoil with a launch which was sent out to search for the rowboat.

At 9 o'clock in the morning Mr. Roosevelt went out on Lake Naivasha in a rowboat, accompanied by two natives. After a short time the boat was surrounded by a dozen hippopotami, which attacked the boat, some of them diving under and striking the bottom of it with their backs.

Kermit Roosevelt has arrived at Naivasha, but the rest of the expedition will not reach here until tomorrow. Edmund Heller of Riverside, Cal., the zoologist of the expedition, caught a 150-pound leopard in a wire trap this morning.

TEN PEOPLE DROWNED ON TARPON ISLAND

Galveston, Tex., July 21.—Ten people were drowned in the water that swept over a portion of Tarpon Island, seven miles from the city. They were washed from the rocky promontories into the gulf and the bodies have not yet been recovered.

CORNELIUS P. SHEA.

Ex-President of Brotherhood of Teamsters Guilty of Attempt to Murder.

New York, July 21.—Cornelius P. Shea, ex-president of the National Brotherhood of Teamsters, was today convicted of an attempt to murder Alice Walsh, a former Chicago waitress, with whom he is alleged to have lived.

Miss Walsh testified that Shea stabbed her 27 times with a penknife on May 21 in their rooms here. For a time her life was despaired of. Shea and the girl quarreled and separated. It is said, when she was told that he had a wife and children in Boston. She returned, however, and four days later the quarrel was renewed, and the assault followed when the girl told Shea she was going to leave him for good.

Shea's only defense was that he had been drinking heavily and was in a state bordering on insanity. He will be sentenced Friday. The maximum penalty is 25 years imprisonment.

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HENEY CONTRADICTS TAWNEY'S STATEMENT

Cordova, Alaska, July 21.—Francis J. Heney, the San Francisco prosecutor, who is at Abercrombie canyon, 65 miles up the Copper river, was notified over the telephone today of the statement made in the house of representatives by Representative Tawney regarding payments to him from the federal government.

Mr. Heney replied: "I have not received a dollar in fees except for services rendered prior to the commencement of the San Francisco graft cases. The delay in payments to me by the United States government was due to lack of funds, necessitating a special appropriation by Congress. A fully itemized statement of all my accounts is in the hands of the United States attorney-general."
