

The Constitution of Oklahoma.

A CONSTITUTION for the new state of Oklahoma has been completed by the convention that has been in session 115 days, at Guthrie, Okla. It will be submitted to the vote of the people of Oklahoma and Indian Territory at a special election Aug. 6. If accepted, it will go to the president for his signature or approval. The convention was composed of 100 Democrats and 12 Republicans. The president of the convention was William H. Murray of Tahlequah, I. T., and representative of the Farmers' union and of the element in politics that is in control in that region. The convention has been embarrassed by the fact that the last 40 days the delegates attended upon their own expenses, and were hampered by a shortage of funds. Congress appropriated \$100,000 to pay the expenses of the elections and the convention. It was not nearly enough and an appeal was made for more. This appeal was refused by Congress.

The proposed constitution, says the Orange Judd Farmer, provides for an electric railway commission with full power to regulate freight rates. The fellow servant doctrine making contributory negligence of fellow servants no bar to recovering damages by an employee from a railroad is incorporated in the constitution. Railroads are prohibited from owning agencies of production, particularly coal mines. A 2-cent passenger rate is required for all railroads in the state, unless the railroad company can show the state commission they are not making money enough to allow a fair interest on their investment. Indian Territory has vast oil and gas fields, and the constitution brings pipe lines under the laws regulating railroads, by making them common carriers. Commissioners to deal with the various economic features of state government are created as follows: Mines and mining, oil and gas, charities, railroads, insurance, agriculture, and labor and arbitration.

The initiative and referendum pat-

terned after the Oregon law was adopted for the constitution of all state officers and United States senators by primaries. Succession in state offices is prohibited, and it is provided that senate committees shall not be named by the lieutenant-governor, but by the senate itself. Oklahoma will be a prohibition state, the most stringent liquor law in existence, forbidding not only the sale, but the bringing of liquor into the state. The issuance of watered stock of corporations is prohibited and the books of all corporations are made subject to inspection at all times.

The legal rate of interest is fixed at 6 per cent, and contract rate at 10 per cent. Taxes shall never exceed 21 mills on the dollar. A state income tax is also provided and a resolution was passed having a national income tax. Former Confederate and Union soldiers are exempt from taxation. The state officers are to hold office for a term of four years. Only the attorney general and state superintendent are allowed to succeed themselves. Imprisonment for debt is prohibited, and a court cannot commit to jail for contempt without a hearing. Women are allowed to vote in local school elections only.

A measure killed by the convention, after a sharp contest, was that providing separate railroad coaches for white and negroes.

The state is divided into 75 counties, 21 judicial districts, 41 senate districts, 105 state representative districts. Oklahoma will have five representatives in Congress. The capital will remain at the present Oklahoma territorial seat of government, Guthrie, until 1910, then a permanent location will be selected by vote of the people. The present laws of the territory of Oklahoma are extended over the Indian Territory until the state legislature creates a code.

One of the remarkable features of the convention was the projected purchase of coal and asphalt lands in Indian Territory. The vast mineral fields of

the territory are owned by individual Indians, controlled by the tribal government of the Chickasaws and Choctaws. The Indians say they are willing to sell land to the state, and the convention ordered the appointment of a commission to negotiate the purchase and report to the first governor. It is estimated the lands can be bought for about \$100,000. It is proposed to sell the surface rights and retain the mineral properties and output in a permanent school endowment. It is proposed to sell the Oklahoma school lands and use the money to buy the mineral lands.

In Oklahoma there has been a territorial form of government for 13 years, while in Indian Territory the only government has been the federal courts, with no taxation for schools, in fact nothing except bureau rule from Washington. The transition to statehood therefore will be a big change for Indian Territory. Oklahoma becoming a state the American Indian in his stronghold practically passes away. In Indian Territory he worked out for himself the principles of government law and order. The five civilized tribes have there maintained for years a system of government that was a credit to their race. Indians made up a large part of the constitutional convention, and showed breadth of view and great sagacity in drafting the constitution. Large numbers of these Indians are very wealthy, owing to the government system of protecting and preserving the lands of their dwindling tribes.

A warm state campaign for political supremacy has begun. The Democrats will use the constitution for a platform, and the Republicans will make their appeal on what they claim are mistakes made by the constitutional convention. The new state will apparently be Democratic.



HEGEMAN CHARGED WITH FORGERY AND PERJURY.
