DROPPED SIXTY FEET TO DEATH.

Two Drawings—Found Dead in Bed—Against Bicycles—Casualty in Arizona—Turtle News.

Toms, Arizona, News: A terrible accident occurred Friday morning about 6:30 o'clock at Maricopa. None of the train crew saw the accident and the train did not stop. A citizen of the town was watching from a bridge on the track. The head and limb were torn from the body and scattered about. A special from Tillamook, Oregon, says that Charles Lamb, a 10-year-old son of O. C. Lamb of Vancouver, went down a cliff 200 feet at Nestucca, and was buried. The cause was not known, though the body was still intact, and was still identified. The boy was ascending the hill at Maxwell's ranch house when he stumbled and fell, rolling over the jagged rocks and falling from shelf lands. He had no chance to get away, and was hastily buried. No bones were found broken, strange to say, unless his skull is fractured. The boy, however, received internal injuries which probably caused his death.

The bodies of two sailors were recovered from San Francisco bay Wednesday, one at the foot of Howard street and the other at the foot of Washington. The former was discovered by Larry Hanley, and was identified as the body of Arthur Whalley, a native of England, 35 years old. He was a member of the crew and had been in the water at least ten days. It is supposed that Whalley fell off the dock while drunk. The other body still lies at the morgue, unidentified, except so far as a man can be apportioned for a burial on the coast. Some of the signs of life were still present, and as the water turned to go down the plank he slipped and fell into the water. Every effort was made to rescue him, but he was lost. The body had been in the water two days. Whalley was a man of about 35 years, poorly dressed.

St. Louis, Mo. D. Trammell: It is quite probable that, from necessity, because of a scarcity of native cattle, a great many cattle breeders will this year buy and sell western range cattle. Some Notes Concerning the States—The Great Number of Watches Used.
