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NEW YORK.
Arrival of Japanese Nobles—A Destructive Gale.

NEW YORK, 13.—The Tribune's Washington special says there is authority for denying the truth of the alleged disclosure telegraphed from this city on Saturday, purporting to represent that the British minister had expressed to the Secretary of State opinions adverse to the retention of commerce with the committee of foreign relations. No conversation or allusion to the subject ever passed between Thornton, or either of the members of the British commission, and Fish.

Another party of Japanese nobles and their suites have arrived in this city from San Francisco.

Mass damage was done in the city by a high gale last night. Apprehensions were felt that the shipping also suffered.

A remittance of 10,000 thalers was forwarded from the North German General Consulate to Berlin, on Saturday, making a total of 40,000 thalers transmitted to Germany from the German Consulate in this city for the German relief fund.

Horace Hallow, dying yesterday, left property valued at nearly two millions, so tied up as to render it valueless to his wife and children. He sent a message to the court, just before expiring, saying that he had always disapproved of adjustments made out of respect to members of the bar, and requested that none be allowed to take it. It is believed that his will will be set aside by the courts on the ground of insanity, in justice to his family.

FOREIGN NEWS.

CREAT BRITAIN.

Wreck and Loss of Life.—The Conference.—Taxation in France.

LONDON, 13.—The Daily News says the Black Sea Conference meets to-day, but up to a late hour on Sunday evening nothing had been decided. The French envoy, was without instructions to attend.

It is reported from Paris that the government intends to levy a tax on imported raw material, especially for textile fabrics. The tax on cotton alone is expected to produce annually from sixty to eighty millions of francs. Foreign manufactured articles will also be taxed proportionately.

The Daily News dispatch from Brussels says all the French prisoners in Belgium have gone home.

The Right Hon. James Stansfield, being accepted a Cabinet office, went to his constituency, in the city of Halifax, for re-election to Parliament, and was returned without opposition.

Eight lives were lost by the wreck of a steam launch on the coast of the island of Jersey.

LONDON, 13, 4 p.m.—The Black Sea conference met, all present, including Broglio.

Moltke is on his way home.

FRANCE.

Versailles evacuated.—Papers suppressed.

PARIS, 13.—Versailles is evacuated and the French garrison is installed. The convention for the return of the French prisoners has been signed at Ferrieres. Some will return by Bremen and Hamburg.

Twenty were killed and sixty injured at Puteaux.

Six radical papers have been suppressed in Paris.

PRUSSIA.

Emperor William III.

BRASS, 13.—The Emperor William is ill at Berlin, but will leave for this city on Tuesday next. The journey will be a direct one, the Emperor's health rendering it inexpedient for him to lengthen the trip by a visit to any of the princes of the Empire.

It is announced that the 7th and 12th Prussian corps, and Wurtembergers will form the army of occupation of the portion of France to be held by the Germans until the conditions of the treaty of peace are fulfilled.

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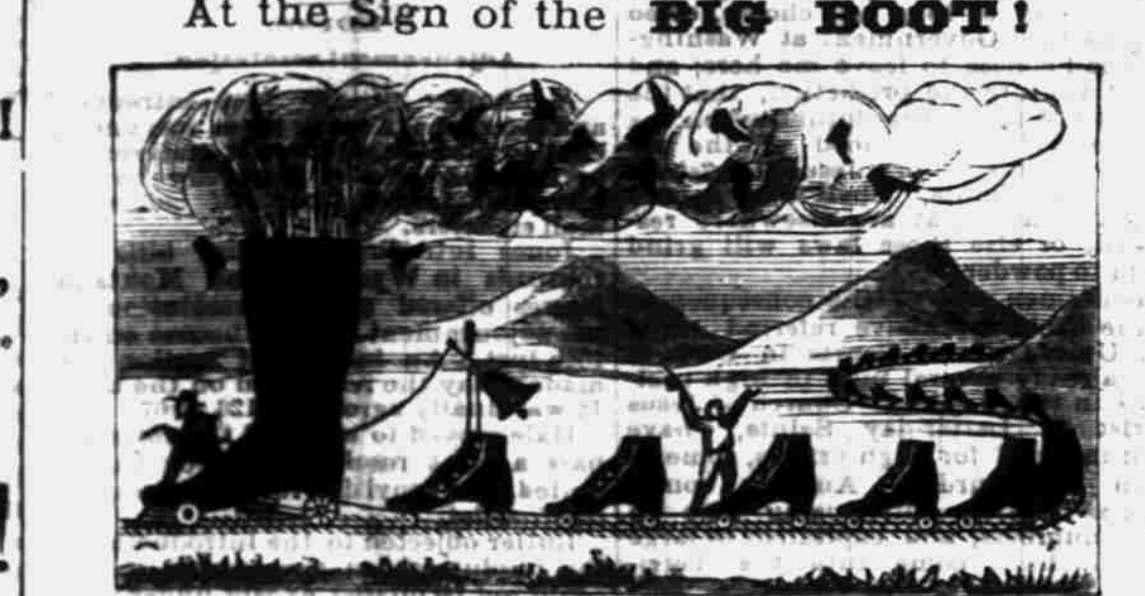
