On Account of Strike, Shell Could Not be Moved.

New Haven, Conn., May 16.—When the eight-oared shell of the Columbia Freshmen in which they will row the Yale Freshmen in the spring regatta, today arrived here, the trucking firm that had been engaged to take the shell to the training quarters on Lake Whitney was unable to get men to move the boat, as its employes are on strike.

A call was issued for volunteers among the Yale men, and about 30 students, including some members of the 'varsity crew responded. The students went to the railroad station, but a crowd of striking truckmen and sympathizers was gathered. Word went round that any attempt to move the shell would cause trouble. The Yale men said they were ready for any sort of trouble.

One of the biggest trucks was taken to the station and the shell was placed upon it by the Yale men amid the feers of the strikers. The students drove the truck through the streets, all 50 of them mounting guard for the shell, which the mob threatened to smash. Decayed vegetables and coal were hurled at them, but not one of them moved. The police soon put in an appearance and prevented scrious trouble. Two policemen were engaged to ride on the fruck, and the students made up a purse for them.
