THE MAINE TROUBLE.

Opinion of Congressmen and others

as to the Settlement of the Dis-

cussion.

WASHINGTON, 23.—The situation

in Maine and the probability of an

appeal to the National Govern-

ment to settle the threatened con-

flict of authority in that State con-

tinues to be the dominating topic of

conversation in Washington politi-

cal circles, and the republicans, not the

freely published denials of yester-

day's reports concerning the atti-

tude of the President and other

prominent republicans on this ques-

tion, there is no positive evidence

obtainable to prove that these re-

ports had a substantial foundation.

Today's discussion appears, how-

ever, to develop an important

point which was generally over-

looked yesterday, namely that the

dominant party in Congress is

likely to hold that if dual govern-

ments are set up, Congress has the

right to decide which is the legal

one, and that the President is not

clothed with any such judicial

power unless in case of insurrection

or domestic violence he is called

upon as commander-in-chief of the

army to preserve the peace.

Representative of Missouri,

in conversation on this sub-

ject to-day, called attention to the

speech of Senator Morton on the

Electoral Bill, in which he had

precisely the position above indi-

cated, and supported it by the fol-

lowing extract from a Supreme

Court decision in the case of Lu-

der vs. Borden:

"Under the Constitution it re-

mains with Congress to decide what

government is established one in a

State, for before the United States

can guarantee to a State a repub-

lican government a State must be

established in a State before it can

be determined

whether it is republican or not.

This view, it will be observed,

does not impair the sagacity of the

general republican plan of action

described in last evening's edi-

tion, for as then intimated the

republicans expect the issue will

be presented by means of an applica-

tion to the President for national

aid to repress domestic violence.
