Gets the Mountain Dell Property for Twenty

Thousand Dollars.

Purchase Brought About by Mayor Thompson and Councilman Hobertson of Finance Committee.

A deed has been consummated by which the city gains control of the Grand ranch at Mountain Dell fork in Parley's canyon, the property being purchased by the city for \$20,000. This matter has been under consideration for some time and was finally left in charge of the chairman of the finance committee, Mr. Robertson, and the Mayor, who closed the bargain for \$5,-00 less than was originally asked for

the property. The ranch consists of 1,300 acres of land with primary water rights, and will add nearly 2,000,000 gallons daily to the water supply of the city. Ac-cording to the terms of the agreement, \$5,000 of the purchase price will be paid down and a deed placed in escrow until Dec. 1st, when the balance will be paid off.
