## UNION PACIFIC GOES UP.

Northern and Southern Pacific Make Good Gains Also.

Concerted Drive Forces Prices Down Again—Live Stock and Produce Higher.

New York, April 4.—Wall street: Trading was active and prices moved slowly upward at the opening. Profit-taking cancelled the rise in special stocks, but conspicuous strength was displayed in the general list. Heavy buying of the Pacific lifted Union Pacific to 80 1/2. At 11 o'clock the general tendency was upward, although there was some irregularity in special stocks. During the first half of the second hour advances were the rule on a large demand for both accounts. Northern Pacific and Southern Pacific made good strikes upward. A concerted drive against the high priced industrials lowered them 1-4 to 2 points. Business diminished on the downward grade and losses in the standard railroad issues were slight.

### BOSTON WOOL MARKET.

Boston, April 3.—The demand for wool here continues to be slow. ## CITY BUYS GRAND RANCH.

Gets the Mountain Dell Property for Twenty Thousand Dollars.

Purchase Brought About by Mayor Thompson and Councilman Robertson of Finance Committee.

A deed has been consummated by which the city gains control of the Grand ranch at Mountain Dell fork in Parley's canyon, the property being purchased by the city for \$20,000. This matter has been under consideration for some time and was finally left in charge of the chairman of the finance committee, Mr. Robertson, and the Mayor, who closed the bargain for \$5,000 less than was originally asked for the property.

The ranch consists of 1,300 acres of land with primary water rights, and will add nearly 2,000,000 gallons daily to the water supply of the city. According to the terms of the agreement, \$5,000 of the purchase price will be paid down and a deed placed in escrow until Dec. 1st, when the balance will be paid off. The city will take immediate possession of the land.

At the last night's meeting of the Council, the agreement was accepted, only a few words being raised against it, and he only pleading for delay of action.

## SIBERIAN GOLD FIELDS.

The Climate and General Conditions Make Strong Caution Necessary.

We notice that the transportation companies and agencies which have begun to work up the Nome boom very actively, are already beginning to add to the attractions they offer reports of "inexhaustible gold deposits" on the Siberian coast, says the New York Engineering and Mining Journal. We have seen how the Russian organization of parties with the intention of exploring the coast regions of North-eastern Siberia, which are not very far from Cape Nome. We think that a strong caution is needed for any persons who may entertain such intentions. It is not impossible that gold may be found in the region mentioned, but the country is even more difficult, as for as climate and natural conditions are concerned, than the Alaskan coast region. Moreover, this is the most important point—the Russian government imposes very strict regulations on prospecting and mining in gold in its territory, and Russian officials have very summary methods of treatment for those who have not complied with the requirements of the law. They have plenty of force at their command and do not hesitate to use it. Transportation into the interior is the lightest penalty which the prospector who undertakes to land and work without proper authority is liable to receive. One of the interior of Siberia escape or rescue is practically impossible. Any project for Siberian exploration which has not the backing of proper government permits and passports is an extremely dangerous undertaking, and should be carefully avoided.

## Arizona Mine Bonded.

On Wednesday last a deal was closed up whereby the Horse Shoe group of copper mines located in the Lone Star district was bonded by L. S. Safford, of Phoenix, by a bond of \$100,000.

This group of mines consists of 11 claims and adjoins the Lone star group on the east, being about three miles east of the San Juan.

This is regarded as one of the valuable properties of the district, and Mr. Qualey is fortunate in securing it. The Horse Shoe mine lies in the shape of a horse shoe, hence its name, and is a vast deposit of copper. The balance of the claims surrounding it.

Mr. Qualey has incorporated a company, and will begin active work as soon as possible, and the prediction that the Horse Shoe will be one of the great groups of mines for which this county is noted will undoubtedly be verified. A force of men will commence work immediately.

Two of these mines will be smelted at the Arizona Copper Smelting company's smelter. As the road from the mines to the smelter is first-class, with a gradual grade all the way the cost of transportation will not be much.—Graham Guardian.
