As to the charge of stupidity, slowness and ignorance, the numerous evidences of the opposite qualities being possessed by the "Mormons," that exist here, is sufficient refutation. In saying that Utah has been the best market in the world for twenty years, only betrays the ignorance of this correspondent. "Can any good thing come out of Nazareth," is a saying that applies to a large class, as to the views entertained of the "Mormons" by those who compose it.

STILL THEY COME.—Our streets for several days past have been thronged with country cousins, hailing from the north, south, east and west. The trains on the Utah Central come in loaded to the guards with visitors, and the State road south of the city for the past two days has presented one continual string of teams, freighted with dusty but cheerful looking passengers; all coming in to attend the Semi-Annual Conference.
