EDITORIAL NOTES.

Extravagant or "fast" living will explain nine out of ten of the cases of others handling money. The moral is patent: Live within your means and you will escape many temptations.

The English papers report, for the first time in eight years, the prospect

of full barns and well stocked granarles, and say there has been no such wheat crop there since 1874. The American farmer who has considerable surplus wheat to sell may not regard these assurances of abundant breadstuffs abroad with unalloyed pleasure, unless he is more of a philanthropist than he is credited with being.

If by a fortunate chain of circumstances the members of the Greely expedition had succeeded in reaching the North Pole, great praise would have been accorded the Signal Service Department, but as it was a heartrending failure in more senses than 'one, many are too ready to heap censure upon General Hazen. There is so much yet to be developed in regard to the enterprise that it would be better to await the result of investigations.

There is little doubt as to the truth of the remark of an old Connecticut physician, to the effect that if a tired patient would do as they do at Saratoga, "get up early, take a walk before breakfast, sit in the shade, take a good rest and sleep in the afternoon, and cut loose from all business cares for two or three weeks, he would thrive as well at home as at Saratoga." The good sense embodied in the Connecticut physician's statement is more or less applicable to any locality.

A telegram from Rome says: The encyclical letter of the Pope, directed against the action of the French Government in adopting the new divorce law, is ready for promulgation. The Pope reminds France that he has already frequently admonished the people against laws contrary to the Catholic Church passed by their rulers. He instructs the bishops of the various dioceses as to the course they should pursue in order to maintain the principles of the church in regard to the sacrament of marriage.

The venerable Louis Kossuth still keeps a close watch on the course of political events in Europe. With respect to Bismarckian diplomacy he is reported to have recently said that the German Chancellor "is sending France to China, Austria to the East, Russia to India, and England to Egypt, in the Europe which he rules." Kossuth possibly ascribes to Bismarck too large a share of the complications which have arisen within a year in the Old World. But this tremendous power is hardly overrated.
