Ogden, June 25 .- It is very eviden the present Ogden city council is going secure for the city a lighting plant of its own, as at the council meeting last evening the following resolution was presented by Councilman Thomas and unanimously adopted, "Resolved That the committee on lighting be and is hereby given power and authority to make such arrangements and agreements as may be necessary to secure a water power site and rights for Ogder city, or to purchase the same at a cost not to exceed \$5,000,"

As some of the council have not visited the proposed site, which is said to be an ideal one, Councilman Thomas extended an invitation to them to accompany him Wednesday afternoon to the site. The movement is one that has long since been looked forward to, and your its consumption seems assured. long since been looked forward to, and now its consummation seems assured. Notice of the councilmen would tell at the present time where the site is located, but it will generate power enough for lighting purposes for Ogden for many years to come.

Lehi, Utah Co., June 22.—The question of having a waterworks system for Lehi is now agitating the citizens. At a meeting of the Commercial club held this evening an irrigation and waterworks committee was appointed to meet with the city council at an early date to take this matter up. It is now proposed to bring water from a spring above Alpine to Lehi through a large pipe line, a distance of about eight miles. Prof. Lyman of the U. of U. was present and estimated that the cost to Lehi, would be about \$50,000 to bring water from this source for a system here. As American Fork is in need of more water to augment its present system, it is proposed to have American Fork join in with Lehi, also the city of Alpine, and get water for the three towns from this source, which would probably lessen the cost to Lehi. During the past week the county commissioners have been visiting the old Jordan bridge west of Lehi, which is in an unsafe condition, and have decided to put a steel bridge across the river there. The present bridge has been in for \$5 years, and has done good service.


