# FATAL FEUD

IN ORECON.

Quarrel of Parents Taken Up by Children,

SCHOOL TRUSTEE KILLED.

After Shooting Him Father Told Son To Get His Kuite and Finish Him, and He Did It.

Union, Ore., March 23.-Woods Gray and his 13-year-old son were brought to the Union county jail last Saturday night on a charge of murdering Archibald M. Halgarth of Elgin. The affair occurred in northeastern Union county, five miles from Eigin, near the Walllowa county border.

Woods Gray and Archie Halgarth were neighbors and foes. Gray was a Centesseean raised in Kentucky and a typical mountaineer. The small sons of the men tought at school the battles of their fathers, and in the complica-tion Gray's son was expelled. he was aking him back to school with olver in his hip pocket, when Halgarth one of the trustees, noticed them from his field and called a halt. There was harrow lane between them with two

As Hagarth crossed the intervening ences to get at G. ay in the county read; mutual recriminations occurred, Gray pulled his revolver and told trustee to stay on his own side. Hal-garth walked over to Gray, siezing him. In the struggle Gray shot four times, hitting Halgarth once. With this mortal wound, he threw Gray down, wrested the weapon from him and began pound-ing him. Then Gray, according to Hal-garith's statement, cried to his son:

"Get your knife and kill the ---".
The boy opened his jackknife and assailed Halgarth, stabbing him times, once penetrating the lung.

They are generally served as a dessert, but cheese, and even cooked vegetables, are used for filling, and in such cases they serve as a vegetable with meat.


