ends its practice season here. Schwartz's injury was caused by a pitched ball striking him while he was at the bat. He was hit in the left temple, the blow causing slight concussion of the brain. TITUS BRINGS SUIT. To Compel Reinstatement in the Union Boat Club. New York, March 21.—C. S. Titus, the champion sculler who last season competed with Henley for the diamond sculls as the representative of the Union Boat Club on the Harlem, but who was expelled from that organization on his return from England, has brought suit to compel his reinstatement. Titus is now a member of the Atlanta club, from which his challenges for the sculls for the coming season have been forwarded to England. The challenges have the indorsement of the National Rowing association. The trouble with the Union club developed into accusations against the sculler's standing in the amateur ranks. It was said he received \$20 from James Pilkington, chairman of the Harlem Rowing association. Mr. Pilkington declared that this was his own money, and was being raised by the club to defray the sculler's expenses. Suit Against Tod. New York, March 24.—A Brooklyn mortgage guaranty company has begun a suit for foreclosure of a mortgage on the home in Brooklyn borough of Tod Sloan. The plaintiffs claim that over two years ago Sloan mortgaged \$100,000 to the house and that no interest on the loan has ever been paid.

About Yacht Race. Philadelphia, Pa., March 21.—A conference has been held at the summer home of P. A. B. Widener, at Elkins, a suburb in which J. P. Morgan was the chief figure. The subject under discussion was the international yacht race between Sir Thomas Lipton's Shamrock III and the America's cup defender Reliance. None of the parties to the conference could be induced to say what transpired. It was stated, however, that business was not discussed, and that yachting affairs alone attracted the attention of the conference. In addition to Mr. Morgan and P. A. B. Widener, there were present Clement Grison of this city; Secretary Carmack of the New York Yacht club; Commodore Bourne, Vice Commodore E. H. Gary; former Commodore Nicholas Kane; C. K. Robinson; Charles F. Lanier; William Thorn, all of New York; and George D. Widener and Joseph E. Widener of this city.

FATAL FEUD IN OREGON. Quarrel of Parents Taken Up by Children. SCHOOL TRUSTEE KILLED. After Shooting Him Father Told Son To Get His Knife and Finish Him, and He Did It. Union, Ore., March 23.—Woods Gray and his 12-year-old son were brought to the Union county jail last Saturday night on a charge of murdering Archibald M. Halgarth of Elgin. The affair occurred in northeastern Union county, five miles from Elgin, near the Wallawalla county border. Woods Gray and Archibald Halgarth were neighbors and foes. Gray was a Tennesseean raised in Kentucky and a typical mountaineer. The small sons of the men fought at school the battles of their fathers, and in the complication Gray's son was expelled. He was taking him back to school with a revolver in his hip pocket, when Halgarth, one of the trustees, noticed them from one of his fields and called a halt. There was a narrow lane between them with two fences. As Halgarth crossed the intervening fence to get at Gray in the county road; mutual animosities occurred, and Gray pulled his revolver and told the trustee to stay on his own side. Halgarth walked over to Gray, seizing him. In the struggle Gray shot four times, hitting Halgarth once. With this mortal wound, he threw Gray down, wrestled the weapon from him and began pounding him. Then Gray, according to Halgarth's statement, cried to his son: "Get your knife and kill the ——" The boy opened his jackknife and assailed Halgarth, stabbing him six times, once penetrating the lung.
