

Jenson's Travels.

LETTER NO. 1.

Several days ago I commenced my regular American tour by becoming a guest at home at Lave, perusing the various records and examining old documents on file. It reveals the fact that there are very early records of the Hawaiian Islands on record at least. The records are on record at the State Archives. It seems to me that we have never had any such record ever kept up to the present period when we have been here. The earliest genealogical record that is a record of baptisms, confirmations, blessings, etc., dates back to 1824. There are scraps of history in the book, but the records made recent containing mostly of general conferences and statistical matters commence in 1824. Statistical reports are on file since 1850.

Wednesday June 1st.—By a thorough perusal of different documents and records I got an insight into the present status of the Hawaiian Islands and mission.

Thursday June 2nd.—This day was observed as a fast day at Lave, and a meeting of the missionaries was held at eleven o'clock at Lamaihi. In the afternoon the officers of the Methodist Society met in the prayer room and had a quieted audience meeting.

Friday June 3rd.—Under George H. Palmer, president of the Oahu conference, started on my historical labors. The Oahu conference embraces all the islands, excepting the Island of Oahu outside of Lave and Honolulu. Oahu is the most important island of the Hawaiian group, though not the largest. It has an area of six square miles. Its extreme width from Makapuu Point on the northeast to the Kahuku Point on the southwest is forty-six miles; its average breadth is twenty-five miles, and a population was 37,000 in 1880. It is situated immediately west of the island of Maui, with which it is connected at the south end.

There are two mountain ranges on the island of which the western (the Ko'olau Range) is the longest and contains a number of deep valleys, while the eastern range is shorter and more broken, running across from one side of the island to the other. The fertile lands lie in the valleys and along the lower spurs of the mountains and extend almost to the sea.

There is very little land, except high up in the valleys and on the coast.

Honolulu is on the south side of the island. Lave is on the northern or opposite side. The two places are thirty-one miles apart. The distance between Oahu and Maui, including crossings, is about one hundred and fifty miles. On the coast road, which connects the two branches, namely, Kauai with Oahu, including crossings, is about 230 miles. Between Oahu and Kauai is about 250 miles. Between Oahu and Waimea is about 250 miles.

The Kahoolae branch embraces the entire island in the vicinity of Kahoolae, including the northern bay, on the district of Kahoolae, and on the northeast shore of Oahu. The branch has a house meeting house dedicated by Elder Matthew Nold, September 24, 1870, and a schoolroom, library, and reading room, also a hall and a hall for the Ladies Aid and Moral Improvement Association for four years. J. Paolo is president of the branch.

The Kahoolae branch comprises the hills lying in a scattered manner, also the northern bay, on the district of Kahoolae, and on the northeast shore of Oahu. The branch has a house meeting house dedicated by Elder Matthew Nold, September 24, 1870, and a schoolroom, library, and reading room, also a hall and a hall for the Ladies Aid and Moral Improvement Association for four years. J. Paolo is president of the branch.

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Saturday June 4th.—I continued my historical labor, and was attended a meeting of the Hotel Societies and the Hotel Association.

Sunday June 5th.—I accompanied Elder John H. Grant to Kahoolae village where we made a short visit, and were welcomed by the Hotel Association.
