It is true that the Mormon Church has voted in the past as its leaders directed, it is none the less true that the Protestant Evangelical churches of the country have done the same. Since the first Presidency of Grant the vote of the Evangelical churches has been solidly republican. The "National Reform Association" includes all the protestant evangelical churches of the country, many of the episcopal and a few of the looser bodies, and the Woman's Christian Temperance Union-also evangelical. The last named body was solidly republican for years.
