

## NAN PATTERSON BREAKS DOWN.

She Could Not Stand the Terrific  
Arraignment of the Prose-  
cuting Attorney.

### TRIAL WAS SUDDENLY STOPPED

The Prosecution Still Maintains That  
Smith Bought Revolver With Which  
Young Was Killed.

New York, April 24.—For the third time within a period of six months Nan Patterson today sat in court and listened to Asst. Dist. Atty. Rand explain to a jury what he, as the public prosecutor, proposed to do to convince them that she was guilty of the murder of Caesar Young. In her previous trials the young woman had had the comfort of her father's presence by her side, but today she sat alone. Recorder Goff having ruled that any scene which might act upon the sympathy of the jurors must be avoided. While the outline of the people's case as given by Mr. Rand today was practically a repetition of those which have gone before, it differed in some material respects. Much of the evidence given at other trials will not be presented this time. It appears, while the prosecution promises to introduce some entirely new features, in opening his address Mr. Rand urged the jurors to forget all that has been said and published about previous prosecutions of the prisoner and to begin with an entirely fair and unbiased mind.

"This has been a most sensational case," he said, "and you are facing a hard ordeal, particularly on account of the sex of the defendant. But this is not a court of chivalry or a court of morals—it is a court of law."

He warned them that the fact that an indictment had been returned against the prisoner must have no weight with them, and that they must not consider as against her the prisoner's mode of life. He considered, however, that it was a misconception to believe that her character had nothing to do with the case. This, he believed, would have a most important bearing on showing a positive motive for the crime.

That the prosecution has not abandoned its contention that the revolver with which Young was killed was purchased by J. Morgan Smith, was shown during Mr. Rand's opening argument. He challenged the defense to produce letters which he said, they claimed to have knowledge of, that would show that Young had threatened to commit suicide, if he had to give up Miss Patterson. He declared that Young never owned nor carried a revolver, and made the statement that "the revolver that killed Caesar Young was purchased by Joseph Morgan Smith."

In concluding his address Mr. Rand told of the alleged confession of J. Morgan Smith, his wife and Nan Patterson to keep Young in this country, that they might enjoy his money, and of the threatening letter written by Julia Smith, Nan's sister, to Young, in that letter, he said, were the words: "Unless you do give up Nan, I cannot answer for the consequences," and declared that "from the moment Young received that letter he acted like a man marked for slaughter."

Mr. Rand narrated the events leading up to the fatal cab ride and the tragedy itself, described the purchase of the weapon, and drew a picture of the murder of Caesar Young in the cab.

"I am going to prove by sworn evidence in this case that during the year he maintained Nan Patterson Caesar Young spent \$50,000 on her," said Mr. Rand.

The strain of listening to the arraignment was too much for Miss Patterson. By the time Mr. Rand concluded his address the first witness, Photographer Cole, was called she was on the verge of collapse. She wavered and her head seemed to be swimming. She called Lawyers Levy and Unger to her.

"I cannot stand it any longer," she gasped. "I am ill, and I am afraid I shall faint if I am not allowed to rest."

Mr. Levy informed Recorder Goff of the young woman's condition and the trial was suddenly stopped.

Miss Patterson was treated by the Tomba physician during the long recess, and when the trial was resumed she appeared to have fully recovered from the attack.

The photographer and architect who had prepared pictures and plans of the cab in which Young was killed briefly explained their contributions to the case, and Policeman Junior then took the stand. It was Junior who ran after the cab in West Broadway soon after Young was shot, and directed the cab

driver to a hospital. His story was a repetition of that which he twice told before.

J. Morgan Smith and his wife, whose names have figured prominently in the case, made their first appearance in court today. William Edward Quinn, who took Miss Patterson from the hospital to the police station, followed Junior on the stand, and told of his connection with the affair.

When he referred to J. Morgan Smith in the course of his testimony, Mr. Rand asked that the Smiths be brought in that Quinn might have a chance to identify them. They are now prisoners in the Tombs on a conspiracy charge in connection with the Patterson case. This witness identified them and they were sent back to prison.

Quinn said that Miss Patterson was in a hysterical condition on the trip from the hospital to the station-house, but that she became cool and collected when the station was reached. She had been there only a few minutes when Smith came in. He went over to Miss Patterson, shook her hand and sat down beside her. When she told him that Young was dead he changed color and gasped.

The witness said that on the trip from the hospital Miss Patterson told him she had nothing to live for now that Young was dead, and begged him to kill her with his club. She told him that Young had no reason to kill his wife. After several other police officials had testified regarding happenings in the police station soon after Miss Patterson was brought there the court adjourned until tomorrow.

### TAKING INDIANS.

Cannot be Done as Long as They  
Are on Reservations.

Helena, Mont., April 24.—Judge Hunt, in the United States court today, decided the noted Indian tax case from Miss. He held that the government could not tax the property of Indians living on reservations.

A temporary injunction against selling the property of Indians which had been assessed, seized and ordered sold was made permanent. The decision means a difference of about \$100,000 in the revenues of the state.

### DRUNKEN INDIAN QUARREL.

Bob Parrish Shoots and Kills  
Bill Beec.

Ukiah, Cal., April 24.—During a drunken quarrel between Indians at the Beattie ranch, Bill Beec was shot by Bob Parrish and died later. After receiving a wound Beec stabbed Parrish in the abdomen, inflicting injuries that may result in death.

### OVER NIAGARA FALLS.

An Unknown Man Deliberately  
Commits Suicide.

Niagara Falls, N. Y., April 24.—A unknown man walked out into the rapids of the American channel above Goat island bridge today and was caught by the swift current and carried over the falls. The suicide was witnessed by many people.

### Alleged Embezzler Arrested.

Phillipsburg, Mont., April 24.—According to advices received by Sheriff Finlay McDonald from La Crosse, Wis., W. P. Oberst, who was arrested at that place, Oberst is wanted by the authorities at Phillipsburg for the embezzlement of about \$800 from the Walker Commercial company, of which firm Oberst was the bookkeeper. Sheriff McDonald left tonight for La Crosse.

### Lieutenant Commits Suicide.

Newport News, Va., April 24.—Lieut. L. A. P. Starks of the German cruiser Bremen, committed suicide by shooting aboard the ship today. His fellow officers declare he was temporarily insane as a result of ill health.

### Burglars After Naval Plans.

Paris, April 25.—The rooms occupied by the director of naval construction at the Outon were ransacked last night. The Journal states that valuables and money were not touched, but that documents and plans were carried off.

### Infantry Off for Philippines.

Cincinnati, April 24.—Companies A and D of the Ninth Infantry, which had been stationed at Fort Thomas for some time, left today for service in the Philippines, going by way of Chicago and San Francisco. Other companies of the command will meet at Chicago and all will proceed to San Francisco over the Santa Fe railroad, where the transport Sherman will be boarded for Manila.

### Oregon Land Fraud Cases.

Portland, Or., April 24.—Several minor defendants in the land fraud cases were arraigned in the United States district court this morning, and the pleas entered by them took a wide range.

Ex-Surveyor-General Henry W. Mel-drum filed pleas in abatement to two separate conspiracy charges. Private Detective Henry P. Ford and ex-Mayor Harry L. Rees filed pleas in abatement to the charge of conspiring with John H. Hall and others to besmirch the character of Dist. Atty. Henry, and David W. Kinnaird and Lily Stipp pleaded not guilty to the indictment returned by the late federal grand jury on Feb. 10, accusing them of aiding Mel-drum in some of his efforts to defraud the government out of portions of its public lands.

### Dr. Gleeden A. Weed Dead.

Bekeley, Cal., April 24.—Dr. Gleeden A. Weed is dead here at the age of 72 years. He was a native of New Jersey and resided in Nevada and in Washington when those states were admitted into the Union. He organized the State Medical board of Washington, and for 10 years was a regent of the university of that state. He was mayor of Seattle for two terms, serving from 1875 to 1879, and took a leading part in suppressing the anti-Chinese riots there. He lived in Berkeley for 10 years, but during that time was afflicted with paralysis.

### Ex-Lt. Gov. Woodruff Married.

New York, April 24.—Ex-Lieut.-Gov. Timothy L. Woodruff and Miss Isabel Morrison were married today in the New York apartments of the bride. Mrs. Woodruff is the daughter of the late John E. Morrison, a successful banker.

### Requisition for Molin.

Sacramento, Cal., April 24.—Gov. Pardee today received a requisition from Gov. Folk of Missouri for the return to that state of Samuel Molin to answer a charge of grand larceny. Molin is under arrest at San Francisco. Action was deferred until tomorrow.

## TERRIBLE STATE OF AFFAIRS IN POLAND.

News From There Paints a Pic-  
ture of Terror Before the  
Expected Storm.

### AWFUL CARNAGE THREATENED.

Country is in Such a State That it  
May be Lighted Up With Flames of  
War at Any Time.

St. Petersburg, April 24.—The news from Poland paints a picture of veritable terror before the expected storm. A letter received here reads:

"You know what happened at Warsaw, but you only know a part of what is occurring throughout the country. At Poland is in a great conflagration of socialism, terror of which is everywhere exciting a terrible panic. We expect at Easter a general massacre of the Russian government officials and the wealthy, and the blowing up of the Vistula bridge to prevent the arrival of troops from Russia."

"The police are doing nothing. They pretend to be blind and deaf to what is passing on around them. The existing regime is the cause of discontent, which is on the increase among the idle workmen driven from the factories and railroads because they are Poles. They say they will have vengeance."

A letter from Vilna says:

"Work is impossible under the existing conditions the government's endlesse commissions have accomplished, and the landlords, workmen and peasants are convinced that open revolt and the bayonet are the only remedies. Easter may witness the inauguration of another insurrection like that of 1863, which began in this way, with a Russian massacre."

Commenting on the above, the Russ declares the government must act promptly if awful outrage is to be avoided. The only thing to be done, it says, is to summon the moderates to give guarantees that the promised reforms will be realized.
