LAWSUIT OF THE
BULLION-BECK.Interesting Showing Found at Office
of State Board of Equalization.

PROFITS ARE MADE PUBLIC.

J. E. Beveridge Talks of Mexican
Miner—A New Incorporation—
The Rich United Verde.

An examination of the records at the office of the state board of equalization discloses some very interesting information in connection with the suit of the Bullion-Beck Mining company against the Eureka Hill and Gemini companies for \$2,300,000 damages for ore extracted from its territory. If the records represent anything like the facts it would appear that the Bullion-Beck is not likely to recover a sum of money that will greatly benefit the stockholders even should it be proved that some of the ore marketed by the defendants has been extracted from Bullion-Beck territory. The records referred to show that for three years previous to February 1 of this year the Gemini and Eureka Hill companies received a net return of only \$201,038.61 for ore marketed. Of this sum the Bullion-Beck had netted \$97,857.24, while the Gemini made \$161,229.37. During the same period the records show that the Bullion-Beck made \$281,000. It is presumed that as the reports are made for purposes of taxation, the amounts stated are fully as low as they ought to be. If, however, the profits are as high as the figures show, the past three years' returns from the Gemini and Eureka Hill properties combined would only be \$251,625. The fact is, it is safe to say, did not net more than that sum, so that the chances for big damages are considered very slight.

UNITED VERDE BONANZA.
Senator Clark's Famous Mine.

In an interesting description of the great United Verde mine, at Jerome, Arizona, the Mining Reporter says the immense ore body has been developed to the depth of 600 feet by shaft, but the diamond drill has found pay ore to the depth of 1,000 feet further. In which the ore body varies considerably, but is not less than 600 feet broad in any developed point. There are drifts of 400 feet in solid ore and that will run ten per cent in copper and that will give also high values in gold and silver. Throughout, the ore is a sulphide of the basaltic character. Yet with the mine, or near at hand, are to be found all needful fluxes for smelting. The mine is a great single slope, subdivided for convenience in working and limited only by the necessity of leaving ore pillars or erecting timber "square sets." As it is, several serious caves have occurred within the past few years, the last one, only a few months ago, twisting the main shaft out of shape. The foundry and great slag dump above settled six feet deep, and in places were holes far deeper. Below the shaft was "thrown out of plumb" several feet and it is far from straight even yet. Several Clark was in Jerome lately and authorized the driving of a new shaft. That this work is in progress is not generally known, but is a fact. It is being run at the present level. It is a monster in size, 60x15 feet, with four compartments for cages and with large spaces for pipes and ladders. Within a few weeks the miners will break through the surface at a point 500 feet distant from the present shaft and entirely outside of the ore body, thus setting aside the danger of further settling or warping.

WEISER SMELTER ASSURED.
Will Cut Off Shipments to Salt Lake
From Seven Devils Country.

Manager F. J. French of the Blue Jacket mine, in the Seven Devils country, who was in Boise Monday is very enthusiastic of the prospects in that section, says the Boise Statesman. The new extension of the P. & L. N. railway from Council to Decorah and the erection of a smelter at Weiser will give a decided impetus to the mining industry of that section. The engineers are now making the survey for the 38 miles of new road. The route selected is up Hornet Creek to Decorah, which will be the terminus for the proposed line. This place is within easy reach of some of the highest mountains in that section, among which are the Helena and Blue Jacket.

Most of the ore from the Seven Devils region have been sent to Salt Lake City, but under the new arrangement the Weiser smelter will keep the ore in Idaho, which will be of value from a business standpoint for our state. There is already 10,000 tons of ore in the Seven Devils country ready for the smelter, so that there will be an ample amount to keep the institution going from the start.

The Boston and Seven Devils Co., owners of the Helena, are now arranging to install the new machinery at the mine, consisting of hoisting pumps, etc. There are also improvements in prospect for the old Penstock mine, consisting of an enlargement of the plant.

The Blue Jacket is pushing down a 500-foot shaft to a depth of 500 feet, which will be equipped with new machinery. This will be put in place about the middle of June.

Excellent though there has been some few months, and this section near the Snake river will eventually make a good showing. The finds consists of copper and silver—the silver ore producing from 10 to 150 ounces and the copper from 10 to 25 per cent.

PECULIAR METHODS.

J. E. Beveridge Describes the Modus
Operandi in Mexican Mines.

J. E. Beveridge, who is now one of the staff of experts, returned last night from a month's trip through Mexico, California and Arizona in the search for bonanzas. Mr. Beveridge visited the old Escondido mine at Ocotlan in the state of Oaxaca in Old Mexico. The mine is located about two days' ride out from Mexico by rail. The primitive methods employed in the extraction and marketing of the ore is the first thing that strikes a visitor. The Escondido mine contains a very rich deposit of silver ore, the high grade of which runs about 300 ounces per ton. The mine is from 12 to 12 1/2 feet wide. It has been opened up to the depth of 500 feet at which point it is now being worked. No modern appliances are used, but on the other hand the methods are of the most primitive kind. The capital stock is placed at \$50,000, divided into 500,000 shares of the par value of one cent each. J. H. Hedges is president; J. J. Treanor, vice president; Frank R. Ball, treasurer; S. L. Hagine, secretary; and F. M. Blepho, John Cain and Frank Jenkins are the other directors.

BOTH GAINS AND LOSSES.

Opening Prices Showed Changes Divided
Between Them.

Dealings Were on a Small Scale—
Union Pacific Dipped Below 100
and Others Yielded.

New York, May 22.—Opening prices showed changes divided between gains and losses. In most cases, they were fractional. Union Pacific lost 1 1/4. Hocking Valley jumped 2 points on the declaration of the first dividend on the stock. One hundred shares of Northern Pacific sold at 17 1/2, compared with 15 1/2 on yesterday's last sale. Dealings were on a very small scale all around. Prices moved up generally after the opening under the impetus of an active demand for various low priced stocks. Erie, Reading, Toledo, St. Louis & Western, Chicago Terminal, Colorado and Southern stocks and Washab issues, which were benefited from 1 to 2 points. St. Paul, Atchison, Sugar, Amalgamated Copper, Missouri Pacific, North American and Union Pacific all showed strength. The rise brought prices of many stocks above yesterday's close. Prices were below the best at 11 o'clock and trading was very dull.

Prices yielded in sympathy with Union Pacific, which dropped below 100. Other stocks were in a measure affected by the resumption of gold exports. Recessions from the best prices reached a point in some of the earlier strong stocks. The Mailing stocks advanced 20 to 25 points. American Car and Leather common were also bought on a rising scale, the former gaining two points. Bonds were strong.

Erie continued its advance to 4 1/4 and awakened the market slightly from its apathy. The common strength of Erie and Washab was called significant in stock exchange gossip. The closing was dull, but steady, and only slightly below the best.
