## LEAGUE WANTS MORE POLICEMEN

Civic Improvement Workers Want Cattle Kept Off the Streets of Ogden.

## VERDICT OF CORONER'S JURY

Respecting the Drowning of Mrs. Hannah Keys, Whose Body Was Found Yesterday.

Ogden, May 19.—The meeting last night of the Civic Improvement League, held in the Weber club rooms, was well attended. There was considerable discussion along the line of improving and beautifying the city. A communication was received from the Ogden Water Works company relative to the move recently made by the league toward the settlement of the controversy existing between Ogden City and the company regarding the validity of the present franchise. The contents of the communication were not made public, but after having been considered by the league, a resolution was adopted declaring itself in favor of effecting an amicable settlement of the litigation, and the granting to the water works company of a new franchise that will meet the approval of the board. The matter will be given a thorough hearing at another meeting, which is called for some time during the latter part of next week.

The league adopted a petition which will be presented to the city council Monday evening asking for the appointment of two mounted policemen, one for the district on the bench and the other for that part of the city lying west of Washington avenue. It is intended that one of the chief duties of these policemen shall be to prevent the running at large of stray cattle and horses in the residence district. In this connection, it was also decided to petition the city council to deny a recent petition presented to that body, in which some citizens asked that they be permitted to graze their cattle in the foothills and the uninhabited eastern part of the city.

The league approved the action of Mayor E. M. Conroy in his recommendation to the council that the city hall square be paved. A petition was directed to the county commissioners asking them to take the necessary steps to prohibit herders from driving their sheep and cattle through Ogden canyon except between midnight and 5 o'clock in the morning.

## CORONER'S INQUIRY

Over the Accidental Drowning of Mrs. Hannah Keys.

Ogden, May 19.—A coroner's inquest over the remains of Mrs. Hannah Keys, the colored woman who was drowned in the Ogden river May 10, and whose body was recovered yesterday by the fishermen, was held at 4 o'clock yesterday afternoon, before Acting Coroner J. D. Murphy and a jury composed of Arthur H. Watts, Amos Schilling and H. A. Lloyd. The testimony of a number of witnesses was taken, among them being a colored woman who was with Mrs. Keys when she fell into the river. She testified that after plunging on the river banks they started to cross the small foot bridge over the stream; all of the party had crossed but Mrs. Keys, who was the last, and as she got into the center of the foot bridge she called out that she was dizzy, and before anyone could reach her hand she fell into the swift running stream, and was gone out of sight. Other witnesses testified to the recovery of the remains yesterday. The jury brought in a verdict that she met her death by accidental drowning in the Ogden river on the 10th of May. Her husband, a Pullman employee, was present when the body was brought to shore, and arranged for the burial to take place yesterday.

## DISTRICT COURT BUSINESS.

O'Laughlin Damage Suit—Divorce and Probate Cases.

Ogden, May 19.—The further hearing of the \$50,000 damage suit brought by Michael O'Laughlin against the Union Pacific has been postponed until Monday morning at 10 o'clock. The testimony of the prosecution, it is expected, will be completed by Monday night. It is also expected that a motion made by the defendant's attorney yesterday afternoon, asking for an order of the court, granting permission to submit the plaintiff to a physical examination, that they expect to try and prove that he is not so severely injured as he claims. O'Laughlin claims that the lower portion of his body is paralyzed as the result of the injuries sustained. Judge Howell granted the motion, and appointed Drs. E. S. Wright and W. Brown Ewing, of Salt Lake City, and Dr. Joyce of Ogden, to examine the plaintiff this afternoon at 5 o'clock, at the office of Dr. E. I. Rich.

## DIVORCE DAY IN COURT.

Judge Howell had a busy hour hearing divorce suits yesterday. The suit of Lizzie Ballinger against John Ballinger was called, the plaintiff and other witnesses testified that the husband had deserted his wife and had failed to provide for his family. James L. Barkwell permitted his wife Hazel Barkwell to get a decree of divorce by default on the grounds of nonsupport.

The divorce suit of Rose Greenwell against Samuel Greenwell was tried and a decree entered in favor of the plaintiff, whose testimony went to show that her husband was guilty of drunkenness and nonsupport.

## PROBATE MATTERS.

H. L. Griffin has filed a petition in the second district court, praying for his appointment as administrator of the estate of his deceased wife, Mary E. Griffin. The estate, according to the petition, consists of stock in the H. L. Griffin company valued at \$1,500 and real estate valued at \$2,500. Mrs. Griffin died in Ogden April 25, 1906. In the matter of the estate of John White, deceased, petition has been filed by C. Olsen, praying for his appointment as administrator. The petition sets forth that White died at Plain City, May 28, 1896, leaving an estate valued at \$200, consisting of real estate, that since his death his wife has died, and he leaves two daughters, Mrs. Jean Porter was appointed by the court administratrix of the estate of James L. Porter, with her bond fixed at \$1,200.
