WEATHER CONDITIONS.

The barometer is highest over the middle and northern Rocky Mountain slope, Missouri valley, and extreme northwest; and lowest over the west Gulf coast, the barometer having risen at all points during the past 24 hours.

Precipitation occurred over portions of the north Pacific states, middle Rocky Mountain slope, plateau region, upper Mississippi and Missouri valleys, lake region and extreme northwest. Excessive precipitation was reported at St. Louis, 2.62 inches.

The temperature fell decidedly over portions of Colorado, Kansas, Texas, Missouri, Illinois, Montana, Minnesota, and Manitoba. The lowest temperature in the United States was 16 degrees below zero in Montana.

Dr. C. M. Garrison was taken suddenly ill Thursday night, and for a time he was not expected to live, but he is convalescent today.

The University Glee club will give a concert and Friday evening, April 1, at which Prof. George E. Skelton will assist with violin solos.

The McConahay stock of jewelry was auctioned yesterday, for the benefit of the creditors. To Manager C. R. Pearsall of J. H. Leyson & Co., for \$3,750.

Owing to the Priesthood meeting being called for Monday evening next in the Assembly Hall, the Fifty-seventh quorum of Seventy will not hold its meeting on that date.

W. E. Young, of the reclamation service, has returned from an engineering trip to the Bear Lake country, where he has been classifying lands under the Idaho irrigation scheme.

The sermon delivered last Sunday morning, by Rev. Fish of the Unitarian church on "Progressive Unitarianism," met with such favor, that by request it will be repeated in the form of a lecture tomorrow morning.

In the Eighteenth ward chapel tomorrow night Rabbi Reynolds of the Jewish congregation will address the joint session of the young people's Mutual Improvement association. His subject is "Russia and Japan," and being a native of Russia, the Rabbi is well able to speak on the burning question of the day. The ward choir will furnish a special musical program. There is a report in legal circles to the effect that suits are to be filed against the Utah Fuel company affecting thousands of acres of its most valuable coal lands. The grounds upon which the suits are based are that the company has entered into contracts with individuals to use their names for filing upon coal lands, the parties dealing with the company for a nominal consideration as soon as patented.

John H. Cahoon has returned from attendance on a convention at Cincinnati of the brickmakers of the country, and after visiting brickyard plants

there, is able to return home and state as a fact that Salt Lake valley brick-makers need not take any backward from eastern manufacturers. In fact the Utah manufacturers are in as good shape to turn out a fine article as any of the eastern yards.

What is known as Pink Eye is prevalent among school children, and consists of an inflamed condition of the eye due to a virus which makes the weakest spot in the anatomy—the case the optical organ. The ailment is not considered dangerous, only care must be taken not to let the inflammation get too far, and it is best to give the eyes a rest. Influenza, which is at present rife for whooping cough, is also having something of a run.

The report of Prof. Horace G. Cummings in regard to Utah's educational exhibit at the St. Louis fair has been filled with the secretary of the Utah commission. The report states that educators all over the state are very enthusiastic over the display and are rendering every assistance possible to make it a decidedly creditable one in spite of the fact that the time for the collection of the exhibit was curtailed by several months on account of trouble in securing space. It is expected that an informal meeting of the Utah commission will be held Monday at which time the report will be discussed.

Dr. W. T. Cannon, who was threatened with the loss of his right arm a week or 10 days ago, is again able to be about and attend to business. The doctor met with a singular accident in the opening of an abscess on a patient. As he laid down his knife he slightly cut the index finger of his right hand. In a remarkably short time his hand and arm commenced to swell and it was apparent he had a bad case of blood poisoning. Now, however, he is on the road to recovery and expects to be entirely well in the course of a few days.

The funeral services of Mrs. Ellen C. Ligan were conducted this morning at 10 o'clock at the Catholic cathedral, and beautiful musical numbers were rendered by Miss Nora Gleason and Miss Lottie Owen. The casket and altar were laden with exquisite floral pieces, the gifts of friends who gathered to pay their last tributes to the departed. The interment took place at Calvary cemetery. Three daughters are left to mourn the deceased, Miss Anna, Margaret and Lulu Ligan, and the sympathy of many friends will go out to them in their bereavement.

CLARK'S LAST RECITAL. It Packed Barratt Hall to the Very Doors Last Night.

Fully 1,000 people attended the recital given by Professor Clark last evening. Barratt hall was filled to its utmost capacity, "Henry V." the poet's hero king, being read. This is the last recital of the series.

Prof. Clark made some explanations at the beginning, and occasionally as the play proceeded. This drama, he said, was never staged nowadays. It really cannot be from its nature, since it is more a drama than dramatic. Henry now does this, now that, and so on to the end. The King is one of nature's noblemen, possessed of fine common sense. The one word consideration is the keynote of the king's character, and the key-note of the drama. The speech of Henry to Catherine—speak to thee as a plain soldier, if thou canst love me—this, I take me, if not, to say to thee that I shall die, is true; but for thy love, by the Lord, no; yet I love thee too—Mr. Clark characterized as consummate common sense in love.

The reading was exceptionally good, from every standpoint. The same, graceful, and natural rendering of the parts marked the entire recital. The audience particularly enjoyed his interpretation of the speech of the king to his bedraggled army just previous to the battle of Agincourt. Most of them have heard a cabalistic recitation of some passage, and they therefore took delight in the absence of the rant which characterized the other. This is one of the best readings we have listened to during the course of these recitals.
