Giles, Wayne Co., May 13.—This place is in Blue valley on the Dirty Devil or Freemont river. It is nearly 70 miles from Loa, the capital of the county, and over roads that would scare a ten-derfoot. The climate is all that could be desired, by those who want a dry, mild, bracing climate. It is not as warm as at St. George, but warmer than Salt Lake valley. The winters here are open, hardly a day in 12 months that a man can't work out doors. It is a rare thing for the snow to lay on the ground, the general com-plaint is that too little snow has failen lay on the ground, the general com-plaint is that too little snow has fallen the past few years. Fruits and vege-tables of nearly all kinds flourish, but the remoteness from market is the chief drawback. Great crops of alfalfa are gathered. Some of the soil has mineral in it but with proper effort it is easy to control. This is essentially a poor man's country, where, by effort and energy, he can build up a good home and make an easy living, but he will and make an easy living, but he will and make an easy living, but he will not find many luxuries nor fine roads to drive on, but pienty of work for willing hands to do, but work that will bring good returns.
