Ogden, Utah, May 16.—The state encampment of the Grand Army of the Republic held here yesterday was most successful in every respect. A more beautiful day could not have been selected for the occasion. The sun shone brightly on the silvered locks of the aged veterans, who have grown white with advanced years, and on every side were evidences of a most hearty welcome. From all parts of the state the veterans of the war, together with their wives and daughters, assembled, and spent a day of real pleasure, and social enjoyment, relieving collectively and individually the sorrows of the past.

There were present about 600 of the aged veterans, and the members of the Women's Relief corps, who partook last evening of a well prepared camp fire and bean supper.
