He stepped onto a machine with a big wind-breaker and started out looking just like a winner. Williams' pace had only about a third of the wind-breaker, and none of the extra sweater. Redman, however, was not looked to as a first class man, and the spectators felt that he was not so good as keeping his own seat behind the leader.

CLOSES THE POOLS.

Judge of Circuit Court Puts Stop to Portland Races.

Portland, Ore., Aug. 15.—What is believed was the last race of the season in Portland was sounded when Presiding Judge Prager, state circuit court, today decreed that the injunction recently issued against selling pools at Livington race track would stay until Sept. 1, when final hearing of the case would be had. Though it is believed an effort at compromise will be made, it is not expected to prove successful, and even though it did and the civil suit were withdrawn, the court has plainly ruled pool selling to be against the law and criminal action could be started.

BRITISH CHAMPION.

Athletic Club Refuses Him Permission to Run in American Contests.

London, Aug. 15.—The Southern course of the British Amateur Athletic association has refused permission to Alfred Shiple, the British champion runner, to go to America to compete in the championships at New York and Montreal. Shiple is the champion distance runner of England, and holds many world records. He has just returned to his home from Australia, where he established new figures for all distances from one mile to twelve. He holds the record of 12:30 for the mile, and 1:10 for the two miles, making the first mile in 1:10 and 12:30. He is looked upon as the most phenomenal long runner in the world, and his intended visit to America had been looked forward to with great interest by American athletes.

The four men making the highest scores will receive gold medals, and the remaining eight will receive silver medals.
