CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 11.—Cockrell

withdrew his objection to a consid-

eration of the joint resolution re-

ported from the committee on In-

dian Affairs, providing for negotia-

tions for the removal of the Ute In-

dians, and offered an amendment

providing that the Indians should

not be settled in the Indian Terri-

tory. The resolution thus amended

was adopted.

Withers, by request, presented a

memorial of William B. Whiting,

Commodore of the United States

Navy, proposing the establishment

of a confederacy of all governments

upon this continent, referred.

On motion of Maxey the Senate

took up the bill making an appro-

propriation of \$200,000 for the erec-

tion of a military post on the

border of the Rio Grande frontier as

may be deemed necessary by the

Secretary of War, for its adequate

protection. Maxey stated that the

bill had passed the Senate, and was

introduced because of its failure to

pass the House.

The Texas frontier was never so

well provided as now, but the ac-

commodation for the safety and

comfort of officers and troops was

altogether inadequate. It was only

just to these hard workers to

give them suitable quarters, such

as the bill made provision for. The

bill then passed.

After a short executive session

the Senate adjourned.

HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, 11.—Manning

offered a resolution calling on the

Secretary of the Treasury to report

what fraudulent claims have been

paid by the Treasury Department

under authority of Section 3,559

Revised Statutes, and what fraudu-

lent claims, if any, have been paid

from other appropriations since

June 23d, 1874, up to December, 1879;

referred.

Converse, from the committee on

public lands, reported a bill amend-

ing the act to grant an additional

right to homestead settlers on pub-

lic lands within the limits of the

proposed March 31, 1879. Converse

stated that under that act, home-

steads who occupied 80 acres,

were authorized to select 320 addi-

tional acres without payment of

registry fees. The present bill

simply provided that registry fees

should be paid for the additional

land.

The invalid pension appropriation

bill was reported, ordered

printed and recommended. It

appropriates \$3,400,000, about \$3,000

more than last year. Ad-

journd.

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, 11.—The Senate

committee on Indian Affairs this

morning took up the Ute Indian

question as presented by the joint

resolution of Hill, Colorado, pro-

viding for negotiations to obtain

the consent of the non-hostile

Ute Indians to their removal to the

Indian Territory, and for the re-

moval of the Ute Indians.

The resolution thus amended

was adopted.

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
