**No Trouble Probable with Peru-  
Bolivia Dispute.**

**Washington, Nov. 13.—The Depart-  
ment of State does not anticipate any  
serious results from the complications  
between this country and Peru growing  
out of the seizure of the building in  
which was situated the United States  
consular agency at Molendo, Peru.**

**The facts as reported to the depart-  
ment by the States Minister Buck  
are as follows:**

**The building seized was the property of  
the Atreque Railroad Company, the agent  
for the company being also United States  
consular agent, had a room in the structure  
occupied by the company.**

**The Peruvian government took possession of  
the building in the absence of the consular  
agent, held it for a few days, and finally  
turned it over to the agent.**

**As the action appeared to be a technical  
dispute, an apology was  
presented, but was rejected by the  
government on the ground that it had done  
nothing for which it was responsible, and  
the bondholders the property has since been  
seized.**

**The State Department is waiting  
further details before proceeding, but  
as already stated, it anticipates no  
more trouble.**

**A Fast Overland Train.**  
**CHICAGO, Nov. 13.—The railway  
lines running between here and Coun-  
cil Bluffs have served notice on each  
other that they will not be bound by

running time of the trains between  
the Atlantic coast and the Pacific.**

which is eleven hours less than any  
other fast train made. The schedule  
will be made between Omaha and San  
Francisco.**
