

Building Boom Unabated-Missionary Calls—Talks to Farmers.

Cardston, Alberta, Canada, March 1—
Spring is indeed here. Of course in Alberta there are many "summers in winter," and an occasional "winter in summer," but altogether the people have enjoyed the finest weather one could imagine in this latitude.

Farming operations are already begun and some seeding was accomplished a month ago. The ground squirrels are out, wild geese a re seen flying over the country, and a sure sign is that spring cleaning and faster hats are in evidence on all sides.

The building boom has not subsided during all the winter months, and during rebruary took on an extra spurt. To see masonry, both rock and brick, in course of construction when we look for 10 degrees below zero, is one of the peculiarities of this but little known corner of the globe. From the office window of the writer can be seen across the St. Mary's river, six or eight miles from here, two steam threshing outfits at work from daylight until dark. It is estimated that there is yet 10 days' threshing to do before the crop of 1995 is completed.

### PACHECO, MEXICO.

Mornion Colony Making Substantial Improvements-Orchards Thriving.

Special Correspondence. Colonia Pacheco, Chihuahua, Mexico, March S.—Though we are away up in the mountains of Mexico, the people are in touch with the rest of the human family by the perusal of the Deseret News, which is a welcome visitor here, in the weekly mails. Hopes are en-tertained that the mail service will be improved, but the Mexican government

is very slow to move in such matters.

The last two years has brought substantial improvements here, brick regi-dences of modern appearance have been erected. A new meeting 'and school house are under construction and when built will meet a long felt want. Last year and during this winter

there have been abundant storms and as a result lots of floods. The snow is quite deep in the surrounding moun-tians. The excuse for a road is in a bad condition. The people have need to more thoroughly cultivate their land and to plant a greater acreage, and en-deavor to get a living from the products of the coll instead of charing around of the soil instead of chasing around after employment in competition with Mexican labor.

The orchards that have been planted made a good showing last year and have demonstrated that the apples raised here are superior in quality and are free from worms.

Lumber has been the chief product of this region, and the terrific haul down the mountain has been destructive to wagon and teams and kept the freighters poor. Parties are now at work to build a flume starting up above Hernandez in Hof valley and extending it to Colonia Juseez, a distance of 40 it to Colonia Juarez, a distance of 40 miles. Mills have been awarded the contract to saw the lumber and it is the intention to begin at the timber and send the material down the flume for its construction lower down. CHUICHUPA, MEXICO IN THE SIERRA MADRES.

"Mormon" Settlement Surrounded by Timber and Mineral Wealth. Special Correspondence.

Chuichupa, chimanna, Mexico, March 3.—This "Mormon" settlements is to ated in the Sierra Madre modutains, about 75 miles from Colonia Juarez. The elevation is near 1,000 feet above the sea level. The road from Colonia Juarez hither is one of the worst in the dry season and great snowfall, the road for most of the way is through a magnificent pine forest, with immense pine trees on every side as far as the eye can reach. There is a great wealth of pine timber here, and it will be available as soon as a convenient way to carry it to market is provided. The most of this great timber concession is held by the American-Mexican Lumber company, whose resident agent, Harry L. Garretson, is located in Mounivalley, about half way between Garcia and Chuichupa, to whom the "News" cor respondent is under obligations for entertainment from the incement weather. There are now about 40 families here in Chuichupa, and they are making some progress. But it is uphill work, as they are so far from a base of supply, and everything has to be pulled over these almost impessable roads. There has been lots of railroad talk, and at the present time the nearest railroad point is some 60 miles away.

in this region, fine ore bodies are opened
in producing a high grade of copper-

up, producing a high grade of coppergold ore.

The Utah Mine company is now incorporated for one million dollars, and has claims covering about 1.500 acres, some of which produce fine ore. The Mexican Gold company are incorporated for three million dollars. B. L. Croft of Colonia Juarez and associates have been promoting these valuable properties, and having secured additional capital expect to start on an active campaign of development. B. L. Croft, Frederick A. Sterns and C. D. Galvin of San Francisco are now at these properties making a thorough examination to the end of making them big producers of wealth. The opening up of these properties will be a big help to Chuichupa as it will give the farmers a market for their products and also furnish employment.
