UNSANITARY BINGHAM.

Attorney General Breeden Addresses a Strong Letter to Town Authorities.

Attorney General Breeden has sent the following stirring communication to the Bingham town authorities relative to the unsanitary conditions that have been obtaining there for so long: Hon. Mayor and Town Council, Bingham, Utah:

Gentlemen—The state board of health has repeatedly made complaint against the unsanitary and filthy condition of a certain part of your municipal corporation. It is charged that a large class of the residents of that part of your municipality running along the canyon stream, use the open stream or creek as an open sewer and permit the contents of their outhouses and other nuisances to be dumped into said stream and carried along and deposited some

distance below. The state board of health has pronounced this condition a public nuisance and has appealed to me to begin proceedings to have the same abated.

If proceedings are commenced they will result heavily upon some, if not all, of the residents responsible for the existing conditions, and I am very reluctant to entail heavy expenses and trouble upon any citizen of this state, unless absolutely imperative. I therefore suggest to you that proceedings be taken by your municipal authorities looking to the abatement of this existing and dangerous nuisance. Perhaps a sewer could be inaugurated without much delay, which would protect the residents there, and those having occasion to visit your locality, from that some action will be taken at once.
