

## CRAVEST POINT IN THE SITUATION

Attitude of the Southern and Central Viceroy.

## WANT NO ENGLISH GENERAL

Germany Does Not Desire Chief Command of Allied Forces, Unless Powers Want It.

Berlin, July 20.—The German government feels confident that the present attempts by Chinese officials to deny the Pekin massacre are insincere, and invented solely by a desire to hamper and retard the power of the joint action of the powers. At the Chinese legation here, where details of the massacre have arrived from the viceroys, a statement was made today to the correspondent of the Associated Press by the Chinese minister himself, Li Ho Hsuan, that he has in no wise replied to the recent prohibition by the foreign office of his use of the telegraph for secret messages, but he has since sent to Count von Buelow several telegrams for approval, which has been granted.

The foreign office considers that the gravest point in the situation just now is the doubtful attitude of the southern and central viceroys, with the evident spread of the anti-foreign hostilities. The news received here is very meager, but it all points to treachery and to a cunning policy of procrastination by the viceroys until the moment shall have arrived when they can afford to discard dissimulations. Yuan Shi Kai, governor of Shan Tung, is regarded here as worse than unreliable.

The foreign office feels glad that all the various rumors have not succeeded in blinding the powers or in retarding their serious military preparations. Officials deny some of the stories printed by the English press, which the foreign office characterizes as made of the same cloth as many that were sent during the Spanish-American war and the earlier stages of hostilities in South Africa. The only story showing any foundation, according to the foreign office, is the question of who is to become commander-in-chief in China, now engaging the attention of the powers. Regarding this foreign office officials say today:

"The intention to make Lord Wolseley or some other English officer the commander-in-chief does not meet with approval anywhere. It is not strange, because the British land force in China is rather insignificant, as well as unauthenticated information shows. The proposal to make a German the chief commander would not be accepted by Germany unless a unanimous wish to that effect was expressed by the powers interested."

The Vossische Zeitung prints a special dispatch from Paris this afternoon, asserting that the French language was declared the vehicle of general communication between the allied contingents in China.

Herr Eugene Wolff, the well known traveler and writer, declares in the Berliner Tageblatt that British policy in China has been solely responsible for the present troubles. "A policy which first coddled up the reform party there and then left them, with the young emperor, in the lurch."

Outlining the terms of the final settlement, he says: "Germany, when peace is re-established, must insist on three points. She must have the prince's palace opposite the British embassy in Peking; China must bind herself to furnish Germany, for colonial purposes, as many hundreds of thousands of colonists as Germany wants; and the Chinese government must erect on German territory in China a university, commercial school, technical school and other similar institutions where Chinese pupils may be taught what European civilization means, thereby killing forever Asiatic barbarism."

At a further step, Herr Wolff recommends that hereafter the viceroys be held responsible for the lives and property of whites in their districts.

The Chinese expeditionary corps will include a corps for field postal service.

## YACHT ATLANTA SOLD.

Columbian Government Purchases It from George Gould.

New York, July 21.—Mr. George Gould has sold the steam yacht Atlanta through Messrs. Gardner & Cox, of this city, to the Columbian government for a gunboat. The yacht is at South Brooklyn, but will be taken in hand at once by the representatives of her new owners and fitted for the service intended.
