CORNER IN JULY WHEAT. Rumors of One on Chicago Ex-

change Send the Price Up.

Chicago, June 3 .- Rumors of a corner in July wheat were rife on the board of trade today. Despite a situation which otherwise would have caused a decline in prices, July wheat, which opened at 74%@75, sold up to 76% during the forenoon, 1½ cents higher than Saturday's close. The buying was led by an influential commission house, which, during the past forinight, is said to have absorbed 10,000,000 bushels of wheat for delivery next month. The opportunity for squeezing shorts, it is aid, lay in the fact that contract stocks in Chicago are now less than 6,000,000 ushels. Later in the session indications of a squeeze in July wheat developed and a scramble of shorts to cover their lines caused an abrupt advance to 76%. At this point the bull leaders who were credited with making the corner. sold about 75,000 bushels and this with profit taking by others induced a re-action to 76%. The short interest was so persistent in demands, however, that the decline was only temporary and under the rally that followed the prices advanced to 781s with hardly the re-action of a shade.
