ments for Settlers.

NUTRIOSO, Apache Co., Arizona, May, 1888. Editor Descret News: Of all the locations of the Saints yet visited in this country of extremes, tae pretty little village of Natrioso has per of horse blankets, in one of which the most pleasant combination of the picturesque and practical in nature, Its meadows, glades, parks, lakes and magnificent surroundings of rugged mountains, and rounded undulating olankets at Katrina's side.
